

# TAXING COAT OFF POOR MAN'S BACK

### Concrete Illustrations of What Protective Tariff Really Means.

## CAUSE WORKERS TO THINK.

Iniquities of the Payne-Aldrich Act Taft's "Best Law Ever" Strikingly Told In Figures.

Concrete examples of how a protective tariff operates are causing the workmen the "poor man" to do a lot of thinking nowadays. He is beginning to understand whether it is not about time to call a halt on the Republican practice of taxing the coat of his back and threatening him with the loss of his shirt and his socks if he does not submit.

All through the present tariff law, passed by a Republican congress and endorsed by a Republican president as THE BEST TARIFF BILL EVER PASSED, are to be found discriminations, the higher duty on the cheaper article, the lower duty on the dearer article, thus placing on the shoulders of those least able to bear it the greater burden of the protective system.

Here are some illustrations: The cheapest wool blankets bear a duty of 163.42 per cent; the dearest, 104.55 per cent.

Flannels, not more than 40 cents a pound, are taxed at 143.67 per cent; over 70 cents a pound, 76.37 per cent.

Wool plushes, cheapest, 141.75 per cent; dearest, 95.33 per cent.

Knit fabrics, cheapest, 141 per cent; dearest, 95.33 per cent.

Stockings, worth from \$1 to \$1.50 a dozen, 76.37 per cent; from \$2 to \$3, 50 per cent.

Hats and bonnets, worth not over \$3 a dozen, 62 per cent; over \$20 a dozen, 85 per cent.

Carpets, highest priced, 50 per cent; that used for mats and rugs, 126.68 per cent.

Women's gloves, unlined, 40 per cent; lined, 84 per cent; longest gloves, unlined, 42 per cent; lined, 29 per cent.

Men's gloves, worth less than \$3 a dozen, 66.23 per cent; costliest gloves, 14.35 per cent; leather, unlined, 44.55 per cent; lined, 29.50 per cent.

Buckles, cheapest, 77.48 per cent; dearest, 26.33 per cent.

Uncut diamonds bear a 10 per cent duty; imitation diamonds, 20 per cent.

The humble firecracker bears a 97.02 per cent duty, while elaborate fireworks bear but 70 per cent.

Mattings, smaller and cheaper grades, 43 per cent; costlier, 24 per cent.

Watch movements, seven jewels, 66.02 per cent; 11 jewels, 40.41 per cent; 17 jewels, 34.45 per cent.

Underwear, cheapest, 56.90 per cent; dearest, 50 per cent.

Dress goods of wool, cheapest, 105.42 per cent; dearest, 94.13 per cent.

Velvets, cheapest, 105.22 per cent; dearest, 49.55 per cent.

Silk handkerchiefs, cheapest, 77.44 per cent; dearest, 59 per cent.

Scissors, worth 50 cents a dozen, 52.21 per cent; worth \$1.75 a dozen, 40 per cent.

Table knives, fancy grades, 57.60 per cent; bone handled, 72.43 per cent.

Butcher knives, best grades, 52.10 per cent; cheapest grades, 38.55 per cent.

Fishes, smallest, 81.29 per cent, long, 93.81 per cent.

Shotguns, worth from \$75 to \$10, 47.67 per cent; worth over \$10, 45.46 per cent.

These are only a part of the discriminations, gleaned from a swift conning of some of the schedules. Reduced to simplest terms, they mean that the poor man is taxed higher than the rich man.

## RESTRICTION OF THE COMMON DRINKING CUP.

Also Regulations to Prevent the Communication of Infectious Diseases.

In accordance with the provisions of Chapter 156 of the Acts of the General Assembly of Maryland of 1912, the following regulations are hereby promulgated:

Section 1. The term "common drinking cup" shall be construed to mean any glass, cup, dipper, or other vessel receptacle or container, exposed on railroad trains or boats, or in other public places within this State, for the drinking of water or other fluids, in such a manner as to allow such receptacles or containers to be used consecutively without previous washing, cleansing or disinfection.

Section 2. The term "public places" shall be construed to mean court houses, hotels, churches, public highways, grand jury rooms, railroad stations, railway cars or other common carriers, barber shops, canneries, machine shops and other manufacturing establishments, stores, libraries, sanatoriums, hospitals, libraries, moving picture places, dance halls, clubs, public baths, base ball grounds, race tracks, public places of amusement, all public and private schools, hotels, asylums, public buildings, public institutions and all other places visited by many persons and usually accessible to the neighboring public.

Section 3. The use of common drinking cups as defined in these regulations is hereby prohibited upon all railroad trains, carrying passengers and all boats carrying passengers while within this State.

Section 4. No person, shall apply his or her lips to the spigot or other outlet of any water cooler, bucket, tank or vessel in which water or other fluids used for drinking purposes is or are contained, nor shall any person apply his or her lips to such tank, bucket or other vessel for the purpose of drinking the contents of the same.

Section 5. Any person, persons, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of these regulations or of Chapter 156 of the Acts of the General Assembly of Maryland of 1912, will be subject to penalties provided by Section 2 of said Act.

Section 6. These regulations having been passed by the State Board of Health at its regular monthly meeting, August 1st, 1912, and having been duly promulgated have the force of law.

## DO ANIMALS LAUGH?

The Mule the Animal With Good Cause for Merriment.

It has been claimed that man is the only animal that laughs. It is even asserted that laughter is the arbitrary distinguishing trait that differentiates the brute from the human.

This ancient belief is not shared by a London photographer and student of psychology, who not only declares animals do laugh, but offers his camera as evidence of the fact. Those twitches and contortions of features which have been regarded as purely involuntary and having nothing to do with mental suggestion are pronounced catchinatory by this psychophysicist.

He has photographed a horse that laughed when somebody said "sugar." He has photographed a smiling fox terrier awaiting a tempting morsel. He has photographed a laughing dog. He is sure the fox terrier grinned. The camera is a great revealer. Its disciple believes it truthfully discriminates between mere muscular contortions and luminous animation.

It is hoped the investigator will not halt in his probing until he has tackled the mule. If there is any animal that appears to have good cause for merriment it is this four-footed practical joker. If the camera declares that the mule laughs the assertion cannot be questioned.

Probably this earnest inquirer will in time shift his researches to the human lineaments. He may learn why man laughs, or why he doesn't. He may give us learned papers on superfluous laughter or suppressed laughter, or uncontrollable laughter. In time laughter may become an exact science—a possibility which all well ordered persons will greatly deplore.—The Cleveland Plain-Dealer.

## Colored Department of Anti-Saloon League.

The Anti-Saloon League announces the appointment of Rev. D. DeWitt Turner, pastor of Ames Methodist Episcopal Church of Baltimore, as the Superintendent of the new Department of Colored Work which will be inaugurated by the Anti-Saloon League of Maryland on November 16, just after the election.

The Colored Ministerial Alliance early in the summer appointed a committee of five, one from each of the Protestant denominations represented by colored churches, to counsel with the League in making the preliminary arrangements. This committee submitted a list of six names of men vouched for by the committee any one of whom would be satisfactory and the Rev. Mr. Turpeau's name was taken from this list. He is a native of Louisiana, spent some time in the South and was educated in part at one of the colored schools in North Carolina and prior to coming to the Washington Conference, which covers this part of Maryland he was a member of the Delaware Conference covering the Eastern Shore. This is the third year of his pastorate at Ames church.

The new department will not be a separate or independent Anti-Saloon League but in political matters will be under the direction of the State executive committee. It will give special attention to the total abstinence, gospel temperance and educational phases of the temperance work with a view to promoting sobriety and respect for law among colored people.

Italy Orders More Motor Vehicles. The Italian War Department has just ordered another hundred motor trucks. It is uncertain whether or not these trucks are intended for use in Tripoli. They will be equipped with Michelin Twin Tires.

Earlier in the year the Italian Government sent to Tripoli a large "fleet" of Michelin equipped Motor Vehicles which were used most successfully for the transportation of provisions and ammunition. The last of the newly ordered trucks is to be delivered by October 15th.

## Various Kinds of Fear.

In an editorial founded on the Titanic disaster, F. P. Dunne writes as follows in the July American Magazine:

"Probably the first thought of every reasonable man in regarding the dreary details of the disaster to the Titanic was: 'What would I have done in the same circumstances?' Probably his second bore the hope in all humility that if such circumstances should arise for him he would behave without too much of the awkwardness of panic. Only a fool would hazard a prediction of his conduct in the face of a peril so unexpected and attended by the terrors of midnight and the sea. It is no discredit to the human race to say that cowardice is a gift from the devil which has been impartially distributed among mankind.

"Every man who thinks at all is afraid of death. He may be more afraid of something else, of loss of honor, health or money, of going to a dentist, or like the man in Pickwick, of life without buttered muffins, but he chooses death only as a bad alternative for a worse. If he is not afraid of one thing you may be sure he is afraid of another. A man will go up to the clouds in a balloon who wouldn't go down into twenty feet of water in a submarine. A steelyjack may be afraid of dogs and a lion tamer of riding in an elevator. We know a man who has made a great reputation for coolness under fire in battle, who gibbers with fear whenever he has the stomachache. One man fears fire, another burglars, another railway trains, another measles.

"Conduct in an emergency depends on many things besides those abstract qualities known as 'courage' and 'bravery.' A man is apt to act calmly when his surroundings, at the time the peril presents itself, are customary and familiar, when his nerves happen to be sound, or when he has time to meditate on his action and weigh carefully its consequences.

"It is well known that men are orderly in peril when they have a set task to perform. We once asked a fireman who had borne himself with great valor in danger if he wasn't afraid. I didn't have time," he said. "I was busy gettin' the people out."

Captain Smith of the Titanic was in the same case. He had his absorbing work to do and it gave him no leisure to think of his fate. So we have seen old men whose death was almost as imminent as his, apparently continue heedless of it until the end through their interest in the affairs of the world.

"Again a man may be persuaded to shame or glory, as the case may be, by the example of his neighbor. One person afflicted by blinding fear may turn a hundred men into a panic-stricken mob or he may convert them into a throng of heroes through their very horror of his conduct. And one man who has established his moral equilibrium quickly can instantly convey fortitude to the others. Courage and cowardice both like company."
