It is Probable That There Will Also Be a Third Speaker of National Prominence.

JUDGE BOND PRESIDES.

Meeting Was Addressed by Hon. Philip D. Laird and W. S. Symington—Opera House Was Packed.

The weekly meeting of the Wilson, Marshall and Talbott Club of Westminster district was held at the Opera House, Tuesday evening, the 22nd. A large crowd was in attendance. The meeting was called to order by Dr. J. H. Billingslea, President of the club, who introduced Hon. James A. C. Bond, who presided at the meeting and introduced the speakers. Judge Bond spoke of his intimate acquaintance with Woodrow Wilson and praised his work at Princeton University and as Governor of New Jersey. The Judge declared that, knowing Wilson as he does and believing that the country at this time needs a man like Wilson in the Presidential chair, he felt so strongly on the subject that he was willing to die for Wilson. The Judge spoke at considerable length about the prevailing unrest in industrial circles, which he attributed to the existing tariff.

W. S. Symington, an attorney of Baltimore City, was the first speaker. The principal address of the evening was made by Hon. Philip D. Laird, Chairman of the Maryland Public Service Commission. Mr. Laird attacked what he called the "tariff graft," fostered and supported by the Republican party. The address was well received and the large audience remained until the close of the meeting.

The next and last meeting of the club will be held on Tuesday evening, October 9th, at 7.30 o'clock at the Opera House. An address will be made by Congressman J. Fred C. Talbott, who is the Democratic nominee for re-election from the 2nd Congressional district of Maryland, which includes Carroll county. Besides there will be another speaker of national reputation whom Mr. Talbott will bring with him to the meeting. The club welcomes the ladies as well as the men at these meetings, but takes this means of making a special appeal to them to control the matter of attendance of children. At the next meeting children will not be admitted unless accompanied by their parents.
