## M. P. CHURCH WILL CELEBRATE 75TH ANNIVERSARY.

### PROGRAM OF INTERESTING SERVICES ARRANGED—RECEPTION MONDAY NIGHT—EX-PASTORS AND MANY OTHER VISITORS TO BE PRESENT.

The four days celebration of the seventy-fifth anniversary of the Methodist Protestant Church of this city will begin on Sunday, November 24.

The opening sermon on Sunday morning will be preached by Rev. J. S. Bowers, D. D., president of the Maryland Annual Conference. Sunday afternoon will be given up to a platform service, when Dr. J. W. Herling will give an "Historical Sketch of the Church." Rev. J. L. Mills, D. D., former pastor will speak on Sunday evening.

On Monday evening at 7.30 there will be a reception and social in the lecture room of the church, participated in by the ministers of the town. Dr. Charles Billingslea will give the greeting on the part of the church and the visiting pastors will respond.

On Tuesday evening Rev. W. R. Graham, D. D., an ex-pastor will preach and Wednesday evening will be devoted to Young People's work, embracing the Sunday School and the Christian Endeavor Society and the address will be by Rev. L. F. Warner, also an ex-pastor.

There will be special music at all the sessions, in charge of the choir, Miss Anna E. Shriver, organist; and at all the services the pastor will preside.

There are but three of the church's ex-pastors living, Dr. Mills, Dr. Graham and Rev. L. F. Warner and each of these has signified his acceptance of the place on the program as indicated above.

In addition to the ex-pastors of the church, an effort will also be made to get many former members of the church and congregation and their friends to return during the anniversary exercises so that it will be a real home coming week for the church.

The Westminster Methodist Protestant Church was organized in 1837 and has had an interesting history. It has numbered among its members and pastors many of the most prominent Methodist Protestant families in Maryland, all of which will be reviewed by Dr. Herling in his "Reminiscences."

The church has a history of which its members are justly proud and is now in a flourishing condition. Dr. Greenfield is now serving his sixth year as pastor and is greatly beloved by his people.

Extensive improvements are being planned to house and care for the Sunday School and the Young People's meetings in a modern, up-to-date room equipped with every convenience and comfort. A special committee is now busily engaged in working out the details of the plan.

All of the anniversary exercises, with the exception of the reception on Monday night will be held in the auditorium of the church and the public is cordially invited to attend.

## UNIONTOWN JOLLIFICATION.

### Big Democratic Parade and Torchlight Procession Last Saturday Night.

A monster parade and torchlight procession was held by the Wilson, Marshall and Talbot Club of Uniontown district. Burrier L.
