CIVIC LEAGUE APPOINTS COMMITTEES.

GENERAL PLAN OF WORK FOR IMPROVING AND BEAUTIFYING THE TOWN OUTLINED—ALL WOMEN URGED TO JOIN LEAGUE.

It was an enthusiastic and earnest body of women who met yesterday afternoon in St. John's parish hall to complete the organization of the Civic League. Between 50 and 60 women were present. Mrs. Charles E. Stewart, the president, was in the chair, and it was first resolved to incorporate the league under the name of "The Woman's Civic League of Westminster and Carroll County." The committee appointed to accomplish this is as follows: Mrs. J. A. C. Bond, Mrs. J. H. Cunningham, Mrs. Ivan L. Hoff, Mrs. Samuel Little, Mrs. C. C. Douglas, Mrs. Edna Erb, Mrs. Harry Dittman, Mrs. Charles Billingslea, Mrs. T. H. Lewis, Miss Lizzie Herr and Mrs. J. T. Anders.

The purpose of the league was then discussed, and suggestions made as to the kind of work to be taken up by the ladies, such as the establishment of a playground, supervision over the character of moving pictures shown in town, appointment of juvenile officers, looking after the sanitary condition of the town, prevention of cruelty to animals and making back yards beautiful with flowers, which could be encouraged by the distribution of flower seed to school children.
