

INVESTIGATING DAMAGES TO GETTYSBURG MONUMENTS

Hard to Find Any Reliable Clue—Footprints Lead to Taneytown Road.

Investigation into the mystery surrounding the identity of the Gettysburg Battlefield vandal has revealed the fact that the damage to the nine large memorials was done with the hammer, as at first supposed. Careful measurements were taken at a number of the monuments, and in a number of instances it was found that everything pointed to the destructive blow having been delivered with a large ax.

To add further to the plausibility of this theory was the further discovery, also upon measurement, that the damage could not have been done with a short handled hammer while the perpetrator stood on the ground, and that some long weapon must have been used. The information gained in Saturday's investigations will, it is believed, throw important light on the matter, and once the instrument is found the discovery of the guilty party may follow.

County Detective Charles H. Wilson, who was commissioned on the case immediately after its discovery, sought for any telltale footprints about several of the monuments, but the crowd of visitors arriving there before the officer had been so large as to make any search unavailing.
