

CARROLL COUNTY COMMITS SUICIDE

Edmund E. Myers Shoots Himself on Eve of Wedding.

Edmund E. Myers, 48 years old, a native of this city, committed suicide in Wilmington, Del., late Sunday afternoon. He shot himself through the right temple while in his room in the dwelling of Coroner Chandler.

Mr. Myers was to have been married Tuesday afternoon to Miss Charlotte A. Hawkins, daughter of Benjamin W. Hawkins, assistant master carpenter of the Delaware division, Pennsylvania Railroad. He secured his marriage license Saturday night. The couple had been going together for 17 years.

Although born in this city, Mr. Myers had been in Wilmington for twenty years. His mother, Mrs. Catherine Myers, lives at 1623 Friendsbury Place, Baltimore. A brother, Clarence, and a sister, Mrs. Ida Miller, also live there. He was buried in Baltimore.

Myers shot himself with a revolver previously used by a suicide. He secured several such pistols during his term as deputy coroner. The one used today was found beside a Boston youth in Wilmington two years ago and ended his life in a hotel.

District Sunday School Conventions.

Following the Second District Sunday School Convention that will be held at Gamber, on the State Road, 9 miles south of Westminster, on Sunday afternoon and evening, June 29th, the First District Association comprising of Hampstead, Manchester, Myers, and Uniontown districts, will hold its 6th annual convention at Uniontown, Sunday afternoon and evening, July 6th, in the Lutheran and Methodist Protestant churches.

Within the limits of the association is a population of 20,679; there are 60 Sunday schools with an enrollment of 7,400 leaving over 13,000 out of the Bible school.
