Work of Carroll County Suffragists

The Just Government League of Carroll county held its first monthly meeting since August at the residence of Mrs. O. D. Gilbert on Tuesday evening, October 21st. No meeting was held in September and it was gratifying to have so large an attendance of members and friends to greet the speakers of the evening; Rev. J. B. Mythen, of Baltimore, secretary of the Men's Suffrage League of Maryland, and Dr. O. E. Tiffany, of Western Maryland College. The two large rooms were filled with a very attentive and interested audience, including a number of gentlemen, when the President, Miss Shellman, called the meeting to order, and Mrs. S. K. Herr opened the exercises with prayer.

The secretary, Miss Whitmore, read the minutes of the last meeting and the semi-annual report, covering the work of the League from April to October inclusive. This report which was also read at the semi-annual State Convention at Chevy Chase, Washington, on Wednesday, October 22nd, stated that from August in January, the number has increased to 84, including the Sykesville branch, organized by Mrs. R. T. Foster, field secretary. Meetings have been held every month except July and September, and public meetings were held in New Windsor, Uniontown, Taneytown, Sykesville, Sandy Mount, and the Opera House at Westminster, at which prominent speakers from other parts of the state were present. Hundreds of pieces of literature have been distributed and over 250 male signers secured to the petition which will be presented to the Legislature asking that the question of suffrage be submitted to the voters. Letters have been written to legislative candidates, Congressmen and the leaders of the different political parties, and suffrage sentiment has been gaining ground all over the county.

After a short business session Misses Marguerite Shunk and Eloise Miller entertained the company with a piano duet, after which Dr. Tiffany spoke on the subject, "Why I am in favor of Woman's Suffrage," and by special request on the Initiative and Referendum, which is attracting so much attention in the political world. His talk was clear, interesting and instructive and was well received which could be understood and appreciated by all and the League is indebted to him for a most profitable and interesting address. He gave a history of the great struggle for suffrage, made by the men of this country and of other lands, and in particular emphasis in the fact that men as well as women had gained it only after a hard struggle.

A violin solo by Master Gilbert Martin was greatly enjoyed, after which Rev. J. B. Mythen, secretary of the Men's Suffrage League, was introduced. Mr. Mythen spoke to a large audience at the Opera House last May, and we expected a treat and we were not disappointed. His arguments in favor of woman's suffrage, were so convincing, his manner so pleasing, the good which can be accomplished by women if given the ballot, and his beautiful tribute to womanhood were an inspiration and fired the enthusiasm of all present. Mr. Mythen is one of the busiest men in the State and his coming to us at this time is most heartily appreciated. While here he was the guest of Mr. and Mrs. O. D. Gilbert and left on Wednesday morning for Washington to speak at the Chevy Chase meeting.

Several new members were received and the meeting adjourned. The next meeting will be held the third Tuesday evening in November at the residence of Mrs. Carroll Albaugh.
