GRAND CARNIVAL FOR SYKESVILLE.

Poultry Show And Merchants And Farmers Association To Be Held For Three Days—Big Parade of Entire Community.

At a rousing meeting represented by the business, professional and clerical men of the town and quite a number of nearby farmers held in the Lyceum October 28, it was unanimously decided to hold a giant celebration in Sykesville, on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, November 18, 19 and 20, under the name of Merchants and Farmers' Carnival and the Sykesville Poultry Association.

Five hundred dollars was set aside as premiums for best exhibits and the entire town, every man, woman and child have gotten behind the movement and with a spontaneous burst of enthusiasm all have united to make this the biggest, brightest and best exhibit Sykesville has ever seen.

The committees are all at work hustling for the success of the carnival. Poultry farmers, who have for years bred fancy poultry in this vicinity, have come together and liberally donated large amounts to make this one of the foremost of Maryland poultry exhibits.

The local fire ladders will follow, after which the third division will follow, including fifty mounted men and numerous carriages and buggies, winding up by the Merchants and Tradesmen's Floats, all decorated and symbolical of the institutions they represent.

The following officers were elected: W. H. D. Warfield—President. E. M. Mellor—Vice-President. Eugene Berry—Secretary. George Schrade—Treasurer.

The following special committee was elected: J. Brooks Mellor, M. H. Weer, R. W. Carter, William M. Chipley, Dr. J. Fred Waesche.

All kinds of household and farm products will be displayed, on which prizes of a substantial amount will be given in each class. Handsome special prizes have been donated by the business houses, institutions and professional men of Sykesville.

The prettiest girl will win a prize. The ugliest man will be rewarded. The largest man will receive a prize. Jellies, pickles, canned fruits, cakes, pies, bread, etc., will all be competing for supremacy.

The farmers will vie with one another in showing the best corn wheat, oats, pumpkins, apples pears, potatoes, etc., on each of which good premiums are placed.

To cap the climax the great and only baby show will make fond parents spruce up the little darlings and show the community what the coming generation will be.

The poultry show held in connection with the carnival by the Sykesville Poultry Association, incorporated, will be the biggest and best it has ever held. The premiums have been increased to encourage far-away fanciers to exhibit their birds, and a great number of specials will make it worth the while of any breeder, no matter how remote, to enter his best.
