COURT HOUSE NEWS.

GRAND JURY ADJOURNS AFTER A FOUR DAYS' SESSION—18 INDICTMENTS FOUND.

The November term of the Circuit Court for Carroll county began Monday morning with Chief Judge William H. Thomas on the bench. Judge Thomas appointed John A. Smith bailiff to the grand jury, John W. Sprinkle bailiff to the petit jury and John T. Frizzell and John W. Freck bailiffs at the gates.

The grand jury after being in session four days adjourned with the following report: To the Honorable, the Judges of the Circuit Court for Carroll county; The grand jurors of the State of Maryland, for the body of Carroll county, for the November term, in the year nineteen hundred and thirteen respectfully report to your Honorable Court:

That they have during the time they have been in session, four days, investigated 21 cases brought to their attention, found 18 presentments and true bills in 18 cases and determined to find no presentments and true bills in three cases examined.

We have examined the license records in the Clerk's office and found quite a number of persons doing business without a trader's license, and a number of persons dealing in real estate without real estate license.

We suggest and advise the State's Attorney to notify such persons engaged in business, either merchandise or real estate, requiring a license, and upon their failure to comply with the law, to institute criminal proceedings before a Justice of the Peace against them.

As required by law this body visited the Jail of the county and found the building well kept by the present sheriff.

The grand jurors also visited the Almshouse of the county and are pleased to say that this institution, as now conducted, is one of the best in the State, and that the Commissioners, as well as the steward, Mr. Humbert, and his wife, are also to be highly commended for the splendid condition, care and management of the institution.

The grand jurors were entertained at the jail and at the Almshouse by Mr. Davis, sheriff, and Mr. Humbert, steward, with delightful refreshments. There being nothing further to engage the attention of the grand jurors they respectfully ask to be discharged, subject to the further call of your Honorable Court.

"I can remember well the ravages made by yellow fever in days gone by, but rejoice to see that the medical fraternity have conquered it.

"I trust that you will be equally successful against tuberculosis."
