## W. M. C. CELEBRATES 44th COMMENCEMENT.

### BACCALAUREATE DAY MARKED BY SPECIAL MUSIC—EXERCISES WELL ATTENDED AND UNUSUALLY INTERESTING.

#### Thirty-Two Students Are Graduated—Many Honors and Prizes are Awarded.

The forty-fourth commencement of Western Maryland College is now a thing of the past. All the exercises of the week in connection with it passed off with the high degree of excellence which has always been a marked feature of Western Maryland's Commencements. The usual large crowds attended the exercises in spite of the fact that the State Firemen's Convention was in session here and that a number of drills and amusements were constantly taking place down town.

The freshmen and sophomore convocations in elocution for the Normal prize came off in Alumni Hall last Friday evening, June 5. These prizes consist of four gold medals, two for freshmen and two for sophomore women, and a young man and a young woman in each of these classes being pronounced successful contestants. The next event of interest was the unveiling and dedication by the senior class of a stained window in the stage of Alumni Hall on Friday afternoon. The window represents the Melpomene, the muse of tragedy, and the design is beautifully wrought out in harmony with the character.

#### Funeral of Virgil.

Instead of the President's Dinner to the seniors which was usually taken place Saturday evening, the class was invited by Dr. Lewis to take a straw ride to Wakefield where a supper was served them at the home of Mrs. Edward Roop, an alumnus of the college. On their return to the college they found the freshmen busily engaged in preparation for the cremation of their enemy—Virgil. But an accident happened to the corpse. Because of its oration could be delivered a spark from one of the torches in the procession dropped on the coffin, and that was the end of it. Afterwards a beautiful display of fireworks was enjoyed on the tennis building in the rear of the main building.

#### Baccalaureate Sunday.

Sunday was a beautiful day and at an early hour automobiles and carriages were running back and forth conveying the large congregation to Alumni Hall to attend the baccalaureate service.

As is customary, no services were held in the Lutheran, Reformed, Methodist Episcopal churches during commencement week, and their members attended the service at the college. Promptly at 10:30 o'clock the students of the college came on the stage singing as a professional Luther's battle hymn, "A Mighty Fortress is Our God." The senior class wore academic costume. The sermon was delivered by Rev. Dr. T. H. Lewis, president of the college, who chose as his subject "The Saviour's Baccalaureate—Peace."

Rev. L. E. Bennett, of Centenary Methodist Episcopal Church, offered the invocation and led the congregation in the Lord's Prayer. The commands were read by Vice President A. N. Ward, with antiphonal responses by the students, and the Psalter was led by Rev. William H. Hetrick, of Grace Lutheran Church, concluding with the Apostles' Creed in concert. The Scripture lesson was read by Rev. E. T. Read, of the Methodist Protestant Church. The service concluded with prayer and the benediction by Dr. Calvin S. Slagle, of St. Paul's Reformed Church.

The college church was supplemented by the Orchestra of Baltimore, both morning and evening. In the morning two anthems were sung: "Thanks be to God," from Mendelssohn's "Elijah," and "Send out Thy Light," by Gounod. Mr. Frank L. Mellor, tenor soloist of Grace Methodist Episcopal Church, Baltimore, sang Knapp's beautiful solo "Open the Gates of the Temple."

A large number of the former students and graduates of the college living in Westminster and many visiting students and alumni of the college met at the Firemen's Building, where the annual State Firemen's Convention was in session, and forming themselves into a procession, including also visiting and local firemen and several bands of music, escorted by the present student body, moved from the Firemen's Building to the College, reaching Alumni Hall in time for the Commencement exercises proper which began at 10:30 o'clock.

As customary the students marched in to the processional "A Mighty Fortress" after the graduates and the faculty all in academic costume, had taken their places on the stage, with members of the board of trustees, prayer was offered by Rev. J. S. Bowers, D. D., president of the Maryland Annual Conference. ## WESTMINSTER'S GALA WEEK

### Streets Thronged With Visitors—Many Fire Companies Attend Convention --- Parades are Feature of Big Demonstration.

#### Much Competition for Prizes—A. F. Fairall, Laurel, is Elected President of Association—Other Officers Chosen. Lonaconing Next Place of Meeting.

Westminster's great Home Coming Week featured by the Maryland State Firemen's Convention, was an overwhelming success from beginning to end, and will long be remembered by the large crowds that thronged our streets every day. Monday was general home-coming day, and every rain that pulled into the station brought men and women back to Carroll county—many who had been absent for a number of years.

The citizens spared nothing to make the event a noteworthy one. Most of the business houses and a number of residences were elaborately decorated, the national colors predominating. The Maryland colors were also much in evidence. At a number of places arches of electric lights were arranged.
