NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS.

Commissioners' Office, Westminster, July 31, 1914. In pursuance of an Act of the General Assembly, passed at January Session 1888, I hereby give the following notice to Taxpayers:

This is to give notice that the County Commissioners of Carroll county have made their annual levy on the assessable property of said county, for State and County Taxes for the year nineteen hundred and thirteen and that all persons or incorporate institutions that shall pay their County Taxes on or before the first day of September, next, shall be entitled to a reduction of two per centum on the amount of said taxes. On State taxes a deduction of five per centum will be allowed if paid on or before the first day of September; and if paid on or before the first day of October, next, a deduction of four per centum; and if paid on or before the first day of November, next, a deduction of three per centum; that said taxes will be in arrears on the first day of January, next, and bear interest from that date; that all persons or incorporate institutions failing to pay their State and County Taxes before the same shall be in arrears with respect to the property and estate of such delinquent liable to be sold for the prompt payment of said taxes.
