

Big Crowd at Emory Grove Camp.

Last Sunday was one of the biggest days in the history of Emory Grove Camp Meeting grounds. Rev. William H. Morgan, D. D., pastor of Calvary Methodist Episcopal Church, New York, preached two great sermons, one in the morning and the other in the evening. His morning text was from the Book of Job, "Though Thou slay me, yet will I worship Thee." In the course of his sermon he pointed out three ways in which people meet trouble: 1. By syndicating their sorrows, forming a stock company of all their troubles and sorrows and passing them on to everybody they meet. 2. By putting their fists together, grinding their feet, gritting their teeth, and a determination to "grin and bear it."

3. Job's way, "By faith in Him I shall live, and by faith I shall die, and by faith I shall conquer." At 3 p. m., Rev. Richard H. Gilbert, D. D., of the Central Pennsylvania conference, preached on the text "Whom say ye that I am?" He gave three glorious mountain glimpses of Jesus Christ: one, Mount Hattin; two, Mount Hermon; three, Mount Olivet.

Dr. Morgan preached an evangelistic sermon in the evening. There were three conversions. Up to Sunday evening there were nine conversions.

A subscription collection was taken in the morning and afternoon, and the amount realized was gratifying.

It is expected that next Sunday will be another record breaking day. A splendid program has been arranged. At 10:30 a. m., and 8 p. m., Rev. J. W. R. Sumwalt, D. D., formerly of Baltimore, now pastor of Southfield Street Methodist Episcopal Church, Pittsburg, will preach, and at 3:00 o'clock in the afternoon, Rev. Don S. Colt, D. D., pastor of Madison Square Methodist Episcopal Church, will conduct an evangelistic service.

The Religious Director of the Camp, Rev. Carlisle L. Hubbard, said long before he prepared his programs that this year's Camp Meeting would be "intensely evangelistic." It is indeed, gratifying that such has been the case. Not only have there been conversions, but the church members themselves have derived great benefit from the services.

No one can make a mistake by attending any of the services, and particularly those of next Sunday. The train and trolley service is splendid, and the hotel and lunch stands are fully equipped to take care of the visitors. Hundreds of people, however, bring their lunch baskets, and find comfortable accommodations in the beautiful grounds of the camp.

Carroll County Sunday School Day.

September 3rd, will be the annual convention and reunion of 100 Sunday schools with an enrollment of 14,384 members, known as Carroll County Sunday School Day. The convention will be held on Middleburg District, in Mrs. Walden's beautiful, well shaded grove at Middleburg Station, on the W. M. Railroad.

Every Sunday school in the county has been asked to send delegates and considering that 75 schools were represented last year when the convention was held 2 miles from railroad station, it is believed a larger number will be represented this year, as all local trains stop at the grove.

The Sunday school fraternity from the four corners of the county will be brought together, eight evangelical denominations will be represented on the program; the large choir will be under the leadership of an able chorister, and it is hoped there will be a record breaking crowd.

Morning session will begin at 10:30 a. m., sharp. At 1:15 p. m., will be meeting of executive committee of county association, at which meeting every member is urged to be present, as well as all officers of the four district associations. Business of great importance will be considered at this meeting.

Afternoon session will begin at 2 p. m.

NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS.

Commissioners' Office, Westminster, July 31, 1914.

In pursuance of an Act of the General Assembly, passed at January Session 1888, I hereby give the following notice to Taxpayers:

This is to give notice that the County Commissioners of Carroll County have made their annual levy on the assessable property of said county, for State and County Taxes for the year nineteen hundred and thirteen and that all persons or incorporate institutions that shall pay their County Taxes on or before the first day of September, next, shall be entitled to a reduction of two per centum on the amount of said taxes. On State taxes a deduction of five per centum will be allowed if paid on or before the first day of September; and if paid on or before the first day of October, next, a deduction of four per centum; and if paid on or before the first day of November, next, a deduction of three per centum; that said taxes will be in arrear on the first day of January, next, and bear interest from that date; that all persons or incorporate institutions failing to pay their State and County Taxes before the first day of January, next, shall be liable to be sold for the prompt payment of said taxes.




