Tariff Bulletin No. 28 issued by the Public Service Commission on Fertilizer from Curtis Bay to Westminster announce a reduction to \$1.25 net per ton, and reduction to \$1.65 net on cement, lime and limestone from Union Bridge to W. P. & C. R. R. Preparatory, it is thought, to the expansion of its terminal facilities at Port Covington on a large scale, the Western Maryland Railway Company has notified lessees of the property it bought from the Winans estate in South Baltimore two years ago that it may want them to vacate within the next 30 or 60 days. For the information of all persons concerned, the following Act of the Legislature, passed March 24th, 1913, is published: CHAPTER 191. AN ACT prohibiting the sale of spirituous or fermented liquors in the several counties of the State on the day of election. SEC. 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That it shall not be lawful for the keeper of any hotel, tavern, store, drinking establishment, or any other place where liquors are sold, or any person or persons, directly or indirectly, to sell, barter, give or dispose of any spirituous or fermented liquors, ale, beer or intoxicating drinks of any kind on the day of election hereafter to be held in the several counties of the State. SEC. 2. And be it enacted, That any person violating the provisions of this Act shall be liable to indictment by the Grand Jury of the county where the offense is committed, and shall on conviction hereafter be held to the County Commissioners, for the use of public roads.
