

**Rally Services.**

Rally services will be held in the Methodist Protestant Church, this city, by Rev. Edgar T. Read, pastor, beginning Sunday morning, October 4, and continuing each night during the week and also the next Sunday. On Sunday, October 4, at the session of the Bible School at 9.30, Mr. George W. Yeiser, president of the Carroll County Sunday School Union will make an address. In the evening Mr. Alfred S. Day, of Baltimore, president of the Maryland State C. E. Union, will address the Society at 6.30, and at the regular preaching hour Rev. Dr. F. T. Tagg, editor of the Methodist Protestant, will preach.

Monday evening at 7.30 Rev. Dr. DeWitt M. Benham, pastor of the Central Presbyterian Church, Baltimore, will give an illustrated lecture on "Oberammergau and the Passion Play." A silver offering will be received at the door. Tuesday evening T. M. Hare, superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League, and other speakers, will address a temperance service. Rev. L. E. Bennett will preside at this meeting. Wednesday evening a meeting in the interest of Woman's Work will be held addressed by Mrs. Mary R. Haslup, president of the State W. C. T. U., and other speakers. Thursday evening there will be an illustrated lecture by Rev. Dr. C. E. Wilbur, of Pittsburg, editor of the M. P. S. S. Literature, on "Missions in China and Japan." The admission will be a silver offering. Friday evening, in anticipation of the Pilgrimage this month to Sam's Creek, there will be an historical meeting held, Rev. Dr. T. O. Crouse will speak on "The Story of Early Methodism in Maryland," and Mr. John T. Stone, president of the Maryland Casualty Company, of Baltimore, will speak on "Methodism's World-Wide Vision."

There will be special music on three evenings: Tuesday by the male quartette; Wednesday by the Church choir, and Friday by Miss Sadie Gere Thomas, soloist, of Baltimore.

On Sunday, October 11, Rev. Dr. C. H. Hubble, secretary of the Young People's Board of the Methodist Protestant Church, will speak at the Sunday school and C. E. Rallies and also preach at the morning service.

**Married Men Live Long.**

Dr. Hans Curadze, the German statistical expert, has discovered a new "barrier" between men and women. After studying the statistics of deaths and marriages he declares: "If men want to enjoy long life they should marry; if women want to grow to a good old age they should remain spinners."

He admits that his conclusions can be established with greater certainty when the city of Berlin publishes its proposed statistical tables of widows, widowers, divorced persons and persons who secured separations at various ages, but he says that tables already available show that married women die sooner than the unmarried, whereas married men live longest.

Statistics show that the fatal age for all males, married and unmarried, is about forty-four, whereas for the married men it lies between fifty-five and sixty.

The fatal age for all women is about fifty, ten years more for unmarried women and nearly ten years less for married.

Thus, if Doctor Curadze's statistics are to be believed, the woman who remains single may expect 20 years more of life than her married sister.

Marriages dissolved by the death of the wife last, on an average, ten to fifteen years, those dissolved by the husband's death usually last 20 to 25 years.

According to this the number of widowers in the average community is always considerably in excess of the number of widows. This is only one of the interesting questions which will be answered by the elaborate statistics now being collected in Berlin.

**Jaws Must Have Exercise.**

"The jaws were designed for use," said Dr. Horace L. Howe in a discussion at the recent meeting of a dental association.

"Recently a strong, handsome, splendidly developed Swedish gentleman came to me for treatment. Every tooth was perfect. The jaws were large and well developed. Only four or five small fillings were present. I remarked that he must have used his teeth when young.

"In reply he told me that his people in Sweden considered bread unfit for food if less than three weeks old. There is no doubt that the use of the jaws in vigorous mastication is the source of stimulation toward their development and the source of preservation of the teeth after they erupt.

"The jaws will not develop without the blood supply, which is, in turn, dependent on the stimulation of exercise.

"One of the most pitiful objects I ever beheld was a boy of perhaps fifteen whose lower jaw was of the size of that of a child of six. What caused this condition? I know it was due to lack of use. Of this I am positive, because the boy had ankylosis of the jaws from childhood. His jaws lacked the stimulation of use."


