ORGANIZE FOR REGISTRATION.

The Democratic party of the State of Maryland is facing the most serious conditions which have confronted it for many years. It is up against the stupendous task of registering every voter within its ranks in four days. Two of these have already been consumed in Tuesday and Wednesday of this week and the only remaining days are Tuesday and Wednesday, October 6th and 7th. If the party people fail to get the voters on the books in the remaining two days, the party will be up against a most serious proposition at the general election in November. One thing is certain—if the Democrats are not registered they cannot vote.

Revenge and hate and sordid avarice go hand in hand across the darkened fields: a moan or a despairing cry guides the ghoul to his victim—Dead men tell no tales.


