METHODISTS AT BIRTHPLACE.

STRAWBRIDGE MEMORIAL UNVEILED UNDER AUSPICES OF MARYLAND METHODIST HISTORICAL SOCIETY—THOUSAND PERSONS REPRESENTING THREE BRANCHES OF DENOMINATIONS PAY TRIBUTE—CHEERS FOR UNITED CHURCH.

Methodist Episcopalians, Methodist Protestants and Southern Methodists of the city and state united as one body, yesterday journeyed to Carroll county, the birthplace of American Methodism, and there at the shrines of its heroes and historic places of worship paid loyal tributes to their memories.

The pilgrimage marked the sequel-centennial of the origin of Methodism in America and was given under the auspices of the Maryland Methodist Historical Society, of which Rev. Dr. John F. Goucher is at the head.

Besides the 100 or more who came from Baltimore on the train, there were at least 100 who made the entire trip from this city in automobiles and teams.

The first stop made by the pilgrims was at the old Stone Chapel on the New Windsor Circuit of the Methodist Episcopal Church and of which Rev. J. T. Marsh is pastor.

George N. Nunsen, of Baltimore, presided at the meeting there. The speakers were ex-Mayor Thomas G. Hayes and Thomas N. Ivey, editor of the Christian Advocate, Nashville, Tenn.

At the conclusion of Dr. Ivey's address the pilgrimage moved on to the John Evans House which came into the possession of the American Methodist Historical Society.

The next place to be visited was the Bethel Church, where dinner was served. This is another of the historic old edifices in that section.
