

BADLY MUTILATED.

Arms and Legs Cut Off, Body Cut in Two.

Alva R. Shipley, 25 years old, employed on the farm of George Garver, near Linwood, was found dead lying along the Western Maryland Railway tracks near the car shops at Union Bridge, on Sunday morning about 4 o'clock by the night watchman, with both legs and arms cut off and his body cut in two. It is supposed that he was struck by the through freight train which passed through Union Bridge some time about midnight. It is supposed he was intoxicated as a bottle of whiskey was found with him.

State's Attorney Weant was notified of Shipley's death, who deemed an inquest unnecessary under the investigation of his death. He was a son of Thomas H. Shipley, a resident of Winfield.

The body was taken in charge by an undertaker.

Foot-and-Mouth Disease at Littlestown.

The foot and mouth disease was discovered Saturday in the herd of Clinton Mehring, near Littlestown, and upon the Basehoar farm adjoining. The stock on the latter place consisting of 40 cattle, and more than 60 hogs, were all affected, the disease having been transmitted through cattle received November 3 from Lancaster yards. The Mehring herd contained 20 cattle and 4 hogs. The disease on the latter place was the result of secondary infection.

Frank Brenden with a force of men, left Monday morning to dig the trench on the Basehoar farm, which is to be 85 feet long, 7 feet wide and 7 feet deep, also the trench on the Mehring farm, which is to be 40 feet long, 7 feet wide and 7 feet deep. STORING CARS FOR WINTER

Removal of Tires From Rims is One of the Most Necessary of Simple Precautions.

When storing cars for the winter, the removal of all tires from rims that are not quick detachable is the first and most necessary precaution against deterioration. After carefully cleaning the tires they should be slightly inflated or just sufficiently to retain their shape and should be wrapped in cloth and placed in a dry room with temperature about fifty degrees. The tires should then be kept in a dark place at all times, as the exclusion of the light preserves the tire and toughens ingredients.

Tubes should be slightly inflated or sufficiently blown up to keep their shape when stored, in a room warmer as the casing. Light will affect tubes as much as tires so that a covering should be supplied before permanently laying up. Very often considerable annoyance is experienced by the motorist when he leaves casings and tubes on the rear of your own wagon and not be moved for the winter months. The experienced will at once appreciate the necessity of removing both casings and tubes from their machine before laying up.
