WHEN THE WOMEN VOTE.

What will happen when the women vote? No one can tell for a certainty. There are those who feel firmly convinced that if the suffrage were extended to include both women and men among voters everywhere all sorts of wholesome laws and regulations would be established in the name of reform.

The primary election in Chicago recently sustains the contention of those who have believed that women voting will make little or no change in results.

One-third of the voters registered for the primary were women and, before the polls opened, the politicians were convinced that the women would dominate the election. But they did not.

The percentage of votes cast, compared with registration, showed that women were proportionately as well represented at the polls as men.

All of which goes to show that women, when given the ballot, are just people, actuated by the same impulses, reasonings and sentiments as men voters. The Chicago candidates and their wives were pictured in each instance going to their respective polling places together just as if they were going to rent a home or going to church.

Some have urged votes for women on the theory that they would purify politics; others have argued that in suffrage States they have not done so. But why insist upon a higher political standard for women than men since both must form their opinions upon the same evidence and conditions.

It was argued by many of the so-called political reformers that the women at the polls would put the political boss out of business. In Chicago these self-styled reformers prophesied the annihilation of Roger Sullivan if the women were given a chance to vote.

He has been winning in the Democratic primaries in Chicago for several years with only the men voting and he won by a greater plurality than ever with the women voting. All of this proves as a rule the politician who can win with only the men of a city or State voting, will win when the women vote also, especially if the women all vote.

WOULD NOT TAKE A DRINK BECAUSE IT INTERFERED WITH BUSINESS.

There is a particularly interesting story told of a bartender in one of the large Western cities who made it a habit never to take a drink during working hours, as he said that no man could attend to his business and drink at the same time. The incident is quite amusing, but nevertheless very true, and the chap who sold the fluid had sense enough to view the relations that drinking had upon business. In part, he said: "A business man could not go to his office and do his work right with thirty or forty drinks under his belt and neither could I. If I took one every time one was offered I'd be drunk seven times over, and that's the truth. And besides I'd lose my job. It is not because I do not like to take a drink, or because I have seen too much of it, but simply because it won't mix with business. It does not take any great will power for me to resist drinking, because my job to me is of greater importance."

Of course it does not require thirty or forty drinks to put a man out—not some, at least—but the bartender was merely speaking with relation to the opportunities when he mentioned those numbers. It is not being "put out" that is the whole consideration, but the matter of impairment of power which one drink will accomplish for some men, and several for lots of others.

PEACE INSTRUCTION IN SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

The Commission on Christian Education of the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America has prepared a complete set of Sunday-school lessons of International Peace to be placed in the regular Sunday school courses and quarterlies of the various denominations. They were prepared by Prof. Norman E. Richardson, of Boston University, under the direction of a Joint Committee representing the Sunday School Council of Evangelical Churches and the World Peace Foundation.

The Commission has also appointed a committee to make a thorough investigation at Gary, Indiana, and elsewhere, relative to the co-ordination of the religious instruction of children with the public school work, the purpose being to prepare a definite proposal to the churches and to the public schools whereby, under their respective pastors, the school children may have religious instructions without sectarian complications, in connection with their general education.
