MAYOR PRESTON AND THE CONTEST IN BALTIMORE CITY.

After four years of strenuous work as Mayor of Baltimore, Mayor Preston is again before the people of the State metropolis as a candidate for re-election to the office he has so well and ably filled that every newspaper in the city, including the two Republican organs, the American and the Star, are vying with each other in the vigor and loyalty of their support of the Democratic nominee.

During his incumbency in the office of Mayor, Mr. Preston has done more for the improvement and well-being of the city in a fraternal sense, than has been done by all his predecessors for more than thirty years. He found Baltimore a mud-hole and he has made it one of the best paved cities in the world. He has built new sewers, and has made other improvements, so many in number that it would take a column of space to enumerate them.

Mr. Preston is now at the front as one of the ablest and most energetic men in the state, and, after his reelection next month he will be recognized as one of the most forceful and influential leaders in the Democratic party in Maryland. His influence and power will probably be felt in the councils of his party to an extent as great as that of any one, or, in fact, any half dozen men. That he will be the leader for whom all Democrats have been looking ever since the lamented death of the late Senator Gorman, is even now apparent to all—for since the loss of Senator Gorman there is no doubt but that the Democratic party has been woefully lacking in the sort of leadership it had been used to for more than a generation.




