Western Maryland to Get 20 Mogul Engines. Because the railroad management looks for a decided increase in traffic during the coming summer and fall months of coal and coke, it is learned that the W. M. has ordered 20 additional freight locomotives of the heavy mogul type, larger than the series of the present 700 class.

According to traffic reports during April approximately 1,200 more loads of freight were delivered to the W. M. from Connellsville division at Dickerson Run than any previous month since that line was opened. Large quantities of steel, pipe and bar wire for export to Europe are being received by the Pittsburg territory for shipment east. It is believed before long the entire normal forces of trainmen, track and shop employees will be returned to work at each terminal.

SCHOOL RALLY BIG SUCCESS

SCHOOL PARADE FINE—WESTMINSTER, PLEASANT VALLEY, NEW WINDSOR AND CRANBERRY SCHOOLS WIN PRIZES—WESTMINSTER HIGH SCHOOL, WIN 44 MEDALS—CONTESTANTS AND NUMBER.

Probably the largest crowd of people ever seen in Westminster, assembled in the town last Friday to attend the School Rally and Public Exhibit Day. Although the weather was very threatening during the early morning hours, the children, parents and teachers were gathered in large numbers at the High School waiting for the parade to begin. To the dismay of everyone, rain began to fall about 9:00 o'clock and it was not until 10:30 that the weather cleared up sufficiently for the line to form. About that time the clouds began to break away and the schools were lined up according to districts and the parade proceeded eastward on Green street to Washington Road, thence to Main street and over the line of march as outlined in last week's issue. It is estimated that, including teachers, children, school officials and members of the Jr. O. U. A. M., at least three thousand people were in line of parade, the entire line extending more than a mile in length. At the head of each school there was a banner bearing the name or initials of the school, and the pupils were decorated with arm bands and sashes, presenting a very gay and festive appearance. As a prize had been offered for the school making the best appearance in the parade, there was a great deal of rivalry in the matter of decoration and each school naturally strove to make the best appearance possible.

The magnitude of the parade was a revelation to the people of the town and presented a splendid object lesson to those who have never given much consideration to the vastness of the problems of educating and training the boys and girls of the county. All along the line the children were liberally applauded and our citizens were enthusiastic in their expressions of approval of the enterprise of our school officials in arranging this practical demonstration of the magnitude and importance of the work of the public schools.

Owing to the fact that the parade was late in starting one very interesting feature of the program, the demonstration of the Domestic Science Departments of the Westminster High School attracted much attention. The exhibits included drawing, composition work, botanical collections, needle work, agricultural exhibits, maps—in short, specimens of almost every line of school activity. The splendid exhibit of work from the Manual Training and Domestic Science Departments of the Westminster High School attracted much attention.

Promptly at 1:45 the educational mass meeting at Alumni Hall, Western Maryland College began. The spacious Auditorium was crowded alike to its full capacity. Members of the School Board and the Board of County Commissioners, and other prominent citizens occupied places on the stage. The meeting was opened with a brief, but forcible address by Superintendent Morelock. Stirring addresses setting forth the problems of the public school system and explaining its needs were delivered by State Superintendent of Public Instruction, N. Bates Stephens, and Dr. T. H. Lewis, President of Western Maryland College, and member of the State Board of Education. In both of these addresses the importance of improved legislation in behalf of the public schools and of better financial support on the part of the tax payers were strongly emphasized, and both addresses were enthusiastically received and generously applauded.

While the meeting was in progress at Alumni Hall preparations were being made for the Athletic Events on the College Athletic Field, which began immediately after the adjournment of the meeting. More than two hundred boys, all pupils of the public schools of our county, were entered in the various events. Under the able and skillful management of Dr. William R. Burdick, director of the Public Athletic League of Baltimore, and his corps of assistants the meet was a tremendous success. In view of the fact that the regular athletic sports constitute an entirely new feature in most of the public schools of our county the interest and enthusiasm displayed in this part of the day's program was truly remarkable. Fully four thousand boys were present on the field at the beginning of the contest at 3:00 o'clock and most of them remained until the last race was run at 5:30.

The prizes offered by the business men of Westminster were awarded as follows: For the best exhibit of school work, \$10.00, divided between the Westminster High School and Pleasant Valley School; for school making best appearance in line of parade, \$10.00, awarded to New Windsor School; for best percentage of total enrollment present in line of parade, \$10.00, awarded to Cranberry School.

MISS GRACE EICHORN MURDERED

BY DR. C. V. DRUEN SHOOTING HER—WERE IN THIS CITY CALLING ON THE FATAL DAY.

Our citizens were shocked on Saturday morning when they heard of the death of Miss Grace Eichorn, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Eichorn, of Baltimore, formerly of this city, who was killed by Dr. C. V. Druen, U. S. N., of Washington, D. C., by shooting her while riding in an automobile. Druen then committed suicide by firing two bullets into his own head, and died instantly.

Miss Eichorn was in this city on Friday to witness the parade of the school children, she also visited a number of friends and enjoyed herself. She was entertained at supper at the Main-Court Hotel, and spent part of the evening at the Star-worship picture parlor and conversed with friends. She was shot and killed within half a block of her home at 11:30 o'clock.

Jealously apparently was the motive for the tragedy, according to the police of the Northeastern district, for among the letters were found several written by Miss Eichorn. The tragedy occurred at Fayette and Rose streets, Chaffee Gooden had been instructed to drive to 200 Luzerne street, and when half a block from that address he heard a shot ring out. Believing that one of the tires had burst he started to put on the brakes. A moment later, two more shots rang out, and, bringing the machine to a sudden stop, he leaped to the street.

According to the statement of Gooden at the Northeastern police district, when he arrived in Westminster, he was instructed to drive to a hotel where the couple had dinner. After the meal they drove through Westminster to visit friends. Three or four stops were made, but at only one house were friends called. When the party began the return trip Miss Eichorn and her companion seemed cheerful and were joking and talking with Gooden.

At no time during the trip did Gooden hear any quarreling. When the city limits on the way in, Miss Eichorn instructed him to drive to her home, giving the address as 200 North Luzerne street.

"At Rose street," said Gooden, "I heard a sudden cry and looking back for a moment saw the man forcing Miss Eichorn down to the floor. I thought something was wrong and was about to ask what the trouble was, when I heard a shot. I looked back and as I did so, two more shots rang out in rapid succession. Then I stopped the car by applying the emergency brakes and leaped to the street."

Evidently Druen came to Baltimore prepared to commit the crime, for the police found two revolvers on him. The one with which he slew Miss Eichorn and himself was of the recently discarded Navy model, .38-caliber. In another pocket the police found a heavy government automatic pistol, of .45-caliber, fully loaded, with the hammer set on the safety, which was to be fired at a moment's notice.

Among the effects of Druen, brought from the Morgue to the Northeastern district Police Station, was a list of names with the request that the persons mentioned be notified. News of the tragedy was broken to the parents of Miss Eichorn early in the morning. When they heard of it they were prostrated and could give very little details, except that their daughter had known Dr. Druen only a short time. Miss Eichorn is survived by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Eichorn, who are heartbroken over the tragedy, and two sisters, Misses Rita and Rita Eichorn.

Miss Eichorn was a beneficial member of the ladies of Macabees of the World, of this city. Mr. George W. Babylon, West Main street, is an uncle to Miss Eichorn, who went to Baltimore Saturday morning and had the body sent to his home in the evening. The funeral was held Tuesday morning at 10 a. m., services at the house by Rev. Wm. H. Hetrick and Elder Uriah Bixler, Interment was at Meadow Branch Cemetery. Pallbearers were Claude Kimmel, Clarence Lockard, Chester Cassell, Reuben Morningstar, Levine Price and Winter Bond. F. A. Sharner, funeral director.

CHANGE IN RURAL ROUTES. Five Carriers Dropped—Carroll Will Have 12 Instead of 17 Routes. The Postoffice Department at Washington, D. C., has notified Postmaster Coonan that on Monday five rural routes will be discontinued. An inspector from Washington will come to this city tomorrow to adjust complaints made by patrons on the discontinued routes.

The mileage has been increased on other carriers to take over the patrons on the routes discontinued. The change will work hardships on the carriers during the winter months, and will make mail deliveries much later.

The routes to be dropped are as follows: Frederick Hook, Carrier 7; George C. Fitze, Carrier 8; Norman L. Hann, Carrier 9; Frank Eckard, Carrier 13; George E. Schaeffer, Carrier 14; John T. Fuhrman, Carrier 16.

The last five will lose their positions with the department. Hook on Carrier 7 will serve on the route of Carrier 8, through being transferred.

PRESTON'S MAJORITY 17,653. The official results of the mayoralty election at Baltimore were given out by the Board of Election Supervisors Friday night. The total vote cast was 97,756. Mayor Preston's majority over Charles H. Heinzman, the Republican candidate, was 17,653, according to the official returns.
