MEMORIAL SERVICES.

HELD IN THIS CITY, WINFIELD, TANEY-TOWN, &c.

Memorial Day was observed in this city by Burns Post, Grand Army of the Republic, with exercises in the Opera House Sunday afternoon, where one of the largest gatherings of citizens ever seen crowded into that play house. The program began with singing by select choir and the audience, and prayer by Rev. Dr. Calvin S. Slagle, of St. Paul's Reformed Church. Commander James S. Baer conducted the opening service and Adjutant John H. Mitten read the records of the dead.

The chairs of seven Carroll county veterans who died during the past year were crowned with flowers by Boy Scouts. The veterans were: John A. Coker, Emanuel E. Leppo, John H. Quail, Isaac Ranoult, Thomas S. Mitchell, George A. Zahn and Hezekiah Morrow. These constituted one-sixth of the total number of the Post, which now has 35 survivors. Charles C. Gorsuch presided during the second part of the program, which consisted of the reading of Lincoln's Gettysburg address by Walter D. Graefe, of Western Maryland College; addresses by Rev. Dr. Havener, pastor of Centenary Methodist Episcopal Church, singing of Kipling's Recessional and other selections with Mrs. H. M. Kimmey as leader, and prayer and benediction by Rev. Carleton Barnwell, rector of Ascension Episcopal Church.

Proceeding the services at the Opera House, the Post, escorted by Company H, First Regiment, M. N. G., and led by the First Regiment Band and the Jr. O. U. A. M. drum corps, and with a number of school children in line, marched to Westminister Cemetery and marked a large number of soldiers' graves with flags and decorated them with flowers. They marched beneath lowering clouds in falling rain. Such interest as was manifested in the entire memorial demonstration has never been shown here before.

Memorial exercises were held Saturday at Round Top, near Winfield, and were attended by many people who braved the elements to hear the speaking, the vocal music by a well-trained choir and instrumental music by the Taylorsville Band. The exercises were in charge of the camp of the Patriotic Sons of America and the few remaining members of Pickett Post, Grand Army of the Republic, who marched in procession to Round Top and decorated the graves of soldiers in Ebenezer Cemetery.

Memorial exercises were held at Taneytown. In the opera house addresses were delivered by Prof. Wm. James Heaps, of Baltimore, and William L. Seabrook, of Westminister.

WALSH TO PENITENTIARY.

Sentenced to Two Years For Killing Woman By Automobile.

James Walsh, president of the Colonial Motor Company, clubman and heir of an estate valued far up in the thousands, was sentenced Tuesday to two years in the penitentiary under his plea of guilty to an indictment charging manslaughter in running down with his automobile and killing Mrs. Annie McEl, Seymour at Charles and Chase streets, Baltimore, on the night of March 12.

Judge Bond, in Criminal Court, Part 2, Baltimore, in passing sentence upon Walsh said that he could see little difference between disregard of motorists for the safety of pedestrians and a deliberate intention to kill. Walsh, who is 29 years old, received the sentence without a tremor.
