

Letter From C. A. Mullinix.

Dear Editor: Being Carroll County's only representative to the Panama Exposition with the Maryland Commission, I shall endeavor to give Carroll Countians a meager description of our trip to date.

Leaving Baltimore on May 6 we arrived in St. Louis the next day at 6 p. m. After an hour's motor ride through the city we had dinner at the Planter's Hotel. We left St. Louis at 9 p. m. over the C. & Q. R. R. Many of the party had been to the St. Louis Exposition, but when we started westward from there most of us were on strange land, indeed. When morning dawned we were in Kansas City, had breakfast and after a drive around the city left at 9 a. m., by the Santa Fe R. R.

Through Kansas was a lovely stretch of level country. On Sunday, May 9, we were traveling over the high plateaus of Colorado and New Mexico. By this time the whole party, sixty-two in number, were pretty well acquainted—indeed, like one large family.

Mrs. Goldsborough was introduced to and shook hands with every member of the party. Everybody is social. Though we were enroute, the fact that it was Sunday was not forgotten. We had religious services (Episcopalians) the singing by the ladies being especially impressive. All joined in or tried to do so.

At Albuquerque, New Mexico, we were allowed time to visit the Harvey Indian Museum. Monday, May 10th, found us at the Grand Canyon in Arizona. This place is wonderful. I shall not attempt to describe it. Leaving all this, we take automobiles and ascend to the summit of snow-capped peaks. Overcoats come in, O. K. Back to Los Angeles to Hotel Alexandria. (I forgot to say that at San Diego I received the first letter from home. It was a more pleasing sight than the many things with which I was less familiar.)

We are now in the land of orange groves, magnificent homes of millionaires and many things that I shall not attempt to describe. Leaving all this, we take automobiles and ascend to the summit of snow-capped peaks. Overcoats come in, O. K. Back to Los Angeles to Hotel Alexandria. (I forgot to say that at San Diego I received the first letter from home. It was a more pleasing sight than the many things with which I was less familiar.)

We took in the "balloon route" trip from Los Angeles to the sea; then 28 miles along the ocean shore, visiting eight cities and ten beaches. Out in the Pacific 26 miles to Santa Catalina we view the wonders of the Marine Gardens from glass bottomed boats. We left this delightful place at 10.15 for Santa Barbara. Breakfast at Hotel Potter, after which we enjoyed motor spins along the coast. Then we had a delightful trip up the coast to Del Monte. Rooms and breakfast at luxurious Hotel Del Monte is well worth mentioning.

Motors are provided for the famous "Seventeen Mile Drive" through the vast park to the old town of Monterey, a wonderful stretch of road between forest and sea.

At last we are in San Francisco, having traveled 4,000 miles, and are at the Hotel St. Francis, with its magnificent surroundings. We meet many former Marylanders here. As we will be here five days we are not so careful about staying together, but each time one of the "Maryland Commission" meets another one we salute, if it is a dozen times a day. The Governor and Mrs. Goldsborough have certainly endeared themselves to all. After attending the ceremonies incident to Maryland Day we will have ample time to see the sights of Frisco.

We are promised a trip to the summit of Mt. Tamalpais, 2,600 feet above the sea level, commanding a wonderful view of the city and the ocean, returning by Muir Woods, where are to be seen some of the finest examples of the famous California trees. We will leave San Francisco Friday, May 21, by the Southern Pacific Railroad, to Seattle; from Seattle to Vancouver we will have a delightful steamship voyage through Puget Sound with its hundreds of miles of picturesque shore line. At Vancouver we will take the Canadian Pacific through the most beautiful scenery of the Canadian Rockies, past Revelstoke, massive ice fields, the great Illecillwaet Glacier, Lake Louise, Lake Moraine, Valley of Ten Peaks and Banff Park, the largest park in the world. Its scenery is said to be incomparably grand and diversified. Then through the Provinces of Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba. Will stop at Winnipeg enroute, past "Lake of the Woods," Fort William and Port Arthur, skirting the shore of Lake Superior. Will stop at Toronto, and after seeing sights of that city will take the Grand Trunk Railroad for Buffalo, and will reach Baltimore on June 4 and Woodbine on the morning of June 5.


