Charles T. Warner, died Monday at his home in Baltimore. His funeral was held Wednesday. Interment was at Manchester.

Death of Former Carroll Countian.

Dr. Samuel Hape, one of the pioneer residents of Atlanta, Georgia, and a prominent fraternalist, died in Hapeville, on July 6. He was born in Middleburg, and spent several years of his early life in Uniontown. He was in his 85th year.

Dr. Hape was born in Middleburg, November 1, 1830. Just before the war he located in Atlanta, joining the Confederate army as a Lieutenant in the 2nd Georgia regiment, where he served with bravery and honor throughout the long struggle. In 1864 he married Miss Orville Rogers, of N. H., and some time in the '80's made his home in Hapeville, the town which bears his name.

During the war he was commissioned by the Confederacy to carry dispatches to its London representative, and to run the blockade with dental supplies from Europe. In this hazardous undertaking his ship was blown up in Charleston harbor, but he managed to get to safety with some of his supplies, the only ones the Confederacy had during the war.

After the war Dr. Hape was prominent in public life in Atlanta, serving in the city council and giving his time to numerous civic enterprises. He was engaged for years, in the dental supply business. His death occurred in Hapeville, a suburb of Atlanta.

Dr. Hape's mother was a Miss Garver. He was a first cousin of Mrs. Howard Slonaker, of Baltimore, who was Miss Maysie Burall.

LOST VALUABLES, BUT LATER RECOVERED THEM

Mrs. W. H. Barnes, Near Mt. Airy, Has Good Luck Following Misfortune.
