WAR AND WAGES.

It would be natural enough if the war should cause a considerable advance in wages. In Europe several millions of workers have been withdrawn from industry, and after the war the loss of life among the soldiers will create a scarcity of workers.

In this country the war has not increased the demand for labor. The war orders have only partially offset the effect of the war in checking our industries. But the men in the concerns that have war orders know that prompt delivery is important, and they hear about hundreds of millions of dollars being paid out for supplies, and conclude that the present is a fine opportunity to get more money for less work than hitherto.

Of course, persons deeply interested in interfering with the production of supplies for the allies recognize the ease of getting strikes called, and very likely they know how to do it by arrangements with certain leaders of the unions. But the broad general fact is that it looks to the wage-earners like the psychological moment for making demands, and the more readily the demands are granted, the more generally they will be made.

We do not doubt that German influences will start strikes in the munition factories and the oil works whenever it is possible, but it is not likely that any large number of workmen in America will go without wages for the sake of helping a European belligerent.

NEW PARCEL POST LIMIT.

Orders by the Postmaster General were issued recently increasing the parcel post limit and providing for a receipt for articles mailed by parcel post. The former becomes effective immediately and the latter on September 1.

Section 454 of the parcel post laws and regulations is to be amended so as to increase the size limit from 72 inches in length and girth combined to 84 inches in length and girth combined. This action follows widespread demand for an increase in the size limit.
