The condition of Patrolman Wade H. EMBARGO ON GRAIN

Western Maryland Road Puts Stop to Domestic and Export Shipments.

With the placing of an embargo by the Western Maryland Railway Company Monday, on all shipments of grain for either domestic or export purposes, "consigned, reconsigned or to be consigned to any station in Baltimore, including the Port Covington elevator, the conditions in local grain circles became acute. This order means that the new elevator on the waterfront, opened less than a month ago, and finished at a cost of \$700,000 to the Western Maryland, is practically useless, so far as relieving the congestion is concerned. The scarcity of ocean-going ships, together with the large volume of grain daily coming into the local elevator at Port Covington is said to have caused the restriction. The order becomes effective at the close of business Tuesday. The company will accept all shipments billed on or prior to this date.


