A WONDERFUL RECORD Not A Single Passenger Killed On The P. R. R. Lines During 1915. Not a single passenger has been killed on any of the lines embraced in the Pennsylvania Railroad system in the past two years, and three years have passed since a passenger was killed on the lines east of Pittsburgh. The average number of passengers carried each year has been 106,660,000. This record for safety shows what can be done when managers and the employees set their minds on a thing. Traveling by rail has become less hazardous than travel in any other way. Horseback riding is much more dangerous, and automobilism is so perilous that if the railroads killed as many as die from motorcar accidents in proportion to the number riding the railroads would be filled with the horrible toll. The rule of safety first is being observed, and it is proving to be a pretty good one. Farmers' Institutes.
