INCOME TAX LAW VALID

Supreme Court So Holds in Unanimous Decision—Congress May Increase Rate.

The income tax was declared constitutional Monday by the Supreme Court in a unanimous decision, which swept aside every contention raised against it, and, in the opinion of Congressional leaders, opened the way for increasing the tax rate on great fortunes to help pay for national defense.

Proposals are pending in Congress to tax incomes of more than \$1,000,000 as high as 60 per cent. Leaders on all sides agree that out of the impetus which the decision today will give such proposals is likely to come a definite movement to levy on the revenues from great private fortunes for some of the millions the Government must raise to carry out the army and navy increases.

"The Supreme Court's decision has absolutely unfettered the income tax as a source of revenue," said Representative Hull, of Tennessee, author of the law. "All doubt is removed, and Congress is left much freer to act. I believe Congress will take advantage of the opportunity to amend the law materially. Without any unusual or unjust charges, it can be made to yield \$185,000,000 to \$195,000,000 a year, as against \$85,000,000 or \$90,000,000 at present."

THE FATHER OF 39

A Man Aged 60 Who Has Been Living Like a Mormon.

Meridian, Miss.—January 22.—F. L. Deason, aged 60, the father of 28 living and 11 dead children, by his wife and three women, sisters, living on the same farm at Collinsville, Ellen, Dosh and Cricket Cochran, is in jail here under a fine of \$50 for unlawful cohabitation. A federal warrant is also held against Deason, a copper still having been found in his home last week.

Deason was tried in Circuit Court on the same charge two years ago and was given a heavy fine. He was released from jail under promise to discontinue his relations with the three women, and because the large family of children has no other support he is endeavoring to appeal the case to the Circuit Court and make bond, but so far has failed to do so.


