EMORY.

W. M. IS ALLOWED TO MAKE DETOUR

Will Use Northern Central System During Tunnel Repairs.

The Western Maryland Railway may detour its trains over the Northern Central system, between Baltimore and a point near Owings Mills, during the repairs to Union Station tunnel, but must provide adequate protection at all crossings on the system, according to a ruling handed down Friday by the Public Service Commission. This order is a great victory for the residents of the Green Spring Valley, who appeared before the commission and protested against the increased number of trains daily without adequate safeguards at the crossings. Although the detour will be but temporary, the commission in passing the order included the recommendations of Chief Engineer Phelps and Transportation Expert Duer. In order to detour the trains the Pennsylvania Railroad must provide safety gates, watchmen, signal bells, etc. There must be a day and night watchman at the crossings where gates and signal bells are to go until the rails are erected. At other points watchmen must be maintained.
