A letter was sent to the State Roads Commission by the board on February 28, as follows: "It having been represented to our board that the owners of two-thirds of the land lying upon the public road, known as the Baltimore & Reisterstown Turnpike (Company) between the Baltimore county line and the city limits of Westminster, about 8 1/2 miles long, desire said road to be constructed under the provision of the State Aid Road or Shoemaker Law, and are to pay for said constructing a sum equal to 10 per centum of the cost of such construction.

Therefore this Board notifies your commission that they intend to have said road built under the provisions of the State Aid Road Law whenever said owners pay the 10 per centum of the cost to this Board or give it an approval bond for the payment thereof.

Upon the verbal petition of certain residents of Carroll county residing in and near New Windsor district, stating that they are willing to and do agree to pay \$1 to this board for every \$2 this board will expend in repairing and reconstructing with stone the public county road known as the Buffalo Road from the corporation limits of the town of New Windsor to the village of Marston, the distance being about two and one-half miles; it has been agreed by the board to expend the sum of \$2 for every \$1 said petitioners or their treasurer or representatives will pay over to this board, in the repair and reconstruction with stone said part of road from the corporation limits of the town of New Windsor to said village of Marston. The above appropriation shall not be expended by this board until the money to be contributed by said residents of Carroll county be actually paid over to this board.

A delegation Monday from Hampstead appeared before the board in regard to building a school house at Hampstead. The board, after considering the proposition, agreed to help the school board repair the present school building.

## SUDLER TO DIE

APRIL 14

### SHERIFF STONER RECEIVED DEATH WARRANT FROM GOVERNOR HARRINGTON YESTERDAY.

Sheriff James M. Stoner received the death warrant for Solomon Sudler, colored, yesterday which calls for Friday, April 14, for the execution.

Sudler is confined in a cell in the jail with guards to watch him, both day and night. He spends most of his time drawing different kinds of animals and buildings that he can see from his cell window. His drawings being very good.

He is in the best of health and in good spirits at all times.

The place of execution has not been made public. The gallows that Sheriff Stoner will use will probably come from Gettysburg, he stated yesterday. The county meetings of Adams county have notified him that the gallows can be bought for \$25, which is very reasonable to our mind.

Sudler is to have the death warrant read to him by Sheriff Stoner tomorrow. The document calls for the execution before 2 o'clock in the afternoon.

The confession of Sudler which was made last week will be printed in book form and sold to raise funds to have his body sent to Baltimore for burial, and what is left is to be presented to a relative he has designated.

### Teachers' Meetings.

Instead of the regular meeting of the Carroll County Teachers' Association at the close of the spring term, a special meeting of the teachers of each election district of the county will be held in which certain matters of interest to all the teachers as well as to everyone interested in public education will be taken up and discussed.

The report of the survey commission appointed two years ago to investigate school conditions in Maryland was received and contains many interesting facts worthy of serious consideration by all who are in any way connected with the public school system of our county. Some of the suggestions and criticisms of the report will furnish material for discussion at these meetings, and in order that the teachers may become familiar with the proposed changes for the improvement of the public school system of the State, they should be present when the various features of the report are considered.

Airy, April 5; district No. 2, at Friezburg, April 6.

All teachers are required to be present at both morning and afternoon sessions. The morning sessions will begin at 9:30 a. m., and the afternoon sessions at 1:30 p. m.
