

THE HANDSOME BANKING ROOM OF UNION NATIONAL BANK.



One Hundred Years of Active Service As a Banking Institution.

April 20th, 1816, just one hundred years ago last Thursday The Union National Bank of Westminster was opened for business, and on that day the Board of Directors held their first meeting. The meeting was held in the Westminster Hotel, now the Main Court Hotel, and from that time the Union National Bank has served this community in a financial way, and stands as a pioneer of the banking in this State.

The first dividend was declared and paid to the stockholders in November, 1816, and the two hundredth dividend will be declared about July 1st, 1916, which shows that this bank has never

The Board of Directors of the Union National Bank being anxious to have its patrons know of the early history of the bank has had a history compiled in booklet form, this being done by the present Cashier, James Pearce Wank. The booklet is quite interesting, and from the sworn statement published therein, shows that this time honored institution is at the present time, in a strong financial condition.

The old records, paper money and other things used one hundred years ago are all in the possession of the bank, and they will be glad to show them to any one who will call.
