


DEATHS.

Gamber. Wm. Snyder Gamber was born July 25, 1829, at East Hempfield Township, Lancaster county, Pa. and died June 3, 1916. He was a son of late Jacob H. and Elizabeth Gamber. He attended various schools at East Hempfield and when 14 years of age was taken to Columbia, Pa. He was bookkeeper at Columbia, Pa. He later purchased an interest in his father's business, candy manufacturing, and moved the business to Lancaster. He then sold out with the intention of moving to Mobile, Ala., and finding Mobile in the grip of a fever epidemic again returned to his native State, where on February 8, 1848, he was married to Elizabeth Beckel. He was moved to Carroll county in 1853, engaged in farming and later taught school at Sandymount. His wife died in 1853 and a year later he married Anne Maria Haines, of this county, and taught school at various places in the county. He was sexton at Providence Methodist Protestant Church for a period of 31 years and also conducted a grocery store during most of that time. He was appointed postmaster at Gamber by Postmaster General Timothy O. Howe, on December 7, 1881, and served in that office 15 years, the post office being discontinued during most of his time. In 1903 he moved to Baltimore county and engaged in farming, also conducted a small grocery store. In 1906 he again moved to Gamber, so named in his honor, and there purchased a small place where he ended his days in peace, being a devoted reader of the Bible and a firm believer in Christ's teachings. He is survived by his wife, Annie Marie Gamber, and the following children, Mrs. Ida Willis, Gamber; Mrs. Charles Warehime, Baltimore; Mrs. Robert E. Barnes, Baltimore; Jacob G. Gamber, near Pikesville; Robert, of Oella; Reuben C., this city; Levi, of Gamber, William, of near Reisterstown; Albert, of Gamber; and Mrs. Emily L. Elliott, Lancaster, Pa. one brother, Reuben, of Lancaster; two sisters, Mrs. George Williams, Stillwater, Tenn., and Mrs. Carrie (Crichtfield), Kansas. Also 52 grandchildren, 84 great-grandchildren and 6 great-great-grandchildren, making a total of 153 descendants, six of whom are of the fifth generation. Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at 3 p. m., in Providence Methodist Protestant church, Rev. Carroll Maddox officiating. Interment in the adjoining cemetery. The pallbearers were Jabez N. Barnes, Levi Barnes, George T. Gorsuch, Thomas J. Miller, William Shanks and H. Clinton Shipley. F. C. Sharrer, funeral director.

ENFORCEMENT OF LAW AGAINST ADVERTISING SIGNS ON PUBLIC HIGHWAYS

Campaign Starts June 1st, 1916. Since the Roadside Tree Law went into effect a little more than a year ago the State Board of Forestry, Baltimore, Md., which is charged with its enforcement, has by means of Forest Wardens throughout the State been engaged in the elimination of advertising signs, supervising the trimming of trees and assisting in the planting of other trees along the highways. This in itself is a big task when there are more than 16,400 miles of roads to cover and more than 2,000,000 trees to be given protection and care. This law, among other things, makes it a misdemeanor punishable by fine to place any advertising signs within the right-of-way of a public highway, or on private property without the written consent of the owner. While most of the roads are comparatively free of unlawful signs, there are many violations of the law even after two years of publicity and the constant tearing down of signs by the Wardens and others.

It is the plan of the State Forester, beginning June 1st, 1916, to make a complete canvass of the State to see that all illegal advertisements are destroyed and to prosecute all violators of the law. The law has been generally posted and sufficient public notice has been given of its provisions. Advertisers should lose no time in removing their signs before the State Forester's men find them and use them as evidence against the advertisers.


