No words by Mr. Hughes after his nomination, it contends, "can in the smallest degree remove the impression that he was willing to win the nomination by hyphen aid, and that his silence, his retreat behind the Supreme Court bench, was a deliberate attempt to get himself votes and support that might be repulsed if he said before nomination what he will have to say later on."


