

Edwin M. Mellor and J. Brooks Mellor, co-partners, trading as E. M. Mellor & Son, Plaintiffs, vs. Michael Nee, administrator of the estate of John Nee of Michael, deceased, Michael Nee and John T. Nee, Defendants.

The object of this suit is to procure a decree for the sale of certain real estate of John Nee of Michael, late of Carroll County, Maryland, deceased, by the creditors of the estate of said John Nee of Michael.

The bill states that the said John Nee of Michael departed this life on the 15th day of March, A. D. 1915, intestate.

That the said John Nee of Michael was in his lifetime indebted unto Edwin M. Mellor and J. Brooks Mellor, co-partners trading as E. M. Mellor & Son, in the sum of \$127.88 for goods, wares and merchandise sold and delivered to the said intestate, as will appear by reference to an itemized account thereof filed with the bill marked Exhibit "A."

That the said intestate was also at the time of his death indebted to divers other persons in large sum of money, as will appear by reference to certified list of claims filed against the estate of said John Nee of Michael and marked Exhibit "B."
