
21,000,000 Able-Bodied Men Of Military Age In The United States.
Washington, July 3.—A Census Bureau table issued today estimates the number of able-bodied men of military age in the United States at about 21,000,000 men.

The estimate is based on the assumption that there has been an increase of 10 per cent in the population since 1910, when the total male population over 18 years and under 45 was 19,183,000. Of this number 14,224,000 were native whites, 2,857,000 were foreign-born whites who had become naturalized, 2,052,000 were negroes and 59,000 were Indians.

In geographical subdivisions the total for the Northern States is 13,094,615, for the Southern States 6,006,139 and for the Western States 1,970,322.
