Bollinger.

Peter Bollinger was found dead in his room Monday morning, at the Exchange Hotel, Hanover, Pa., where he made his home with Mr. and Mrs. Josiah Becker. Mr. Bollinger retired Sunday evening in the best of health and on account of the extreme hot weather he made his bed on the floor of his room.

The deceased who was aged 57 years, 2 months and 22 days, was twice married. His first wife, who was Miss Sarah Saubel, died 23 years ago. Fifteen years ago, he was married to Miss Mabel Luckenbaugh, who survives with three sons from his first wife, Paul, of Hanover, Pa.; Harvey, of Hanover, Pa.; Edward, of Waynesboro; and three daughters and one son from his second wife, Mamie and Annie, of Hanover. Cramer.



Thos. C. Galbreath Dead.

Thomas Crawford Galbreath, formerly of Jarrettsville, Harford county, Md., died of tuberculosis at Etes Park, Col. on Monday last. He was 49 years old. For three years, from 1899 to 1902, Mr. Galbreath was superintendent of schools in Harford county, and he was also a teacher at Western Maryland College. He was pursuing a course of studies in preparation for his degree of doctor of philosophy at Harvard University when he contracted tuberculosis, and since then he had been at Denver.

He is known as a writer of many short stories and is the author of two books, which are autobiographical in character, being based upon his own experiences. One of these works is entitled "Chasing the Cure in Colorado," and the other is entitled "T. B. Mr. Galbreath was a man of remarkable personality, and as a teacher was known among the educators of Maryland as a young man of unusual promise. He had many friends in Denver, where he was engaged in business and carried on his literary pursuits. Every couple of years he would visit his home folks at Jarrettsville. About two years ago when his health gave promise of returning, he married Miss Elizabeth McNeal, of Denver.
