Suits Against Policy Holders for back Assessments.

Last week the receivers of The Grangers' Mutual Fire and Storm Insurance Company of Carroll county, entered 110 suits for small amounts, totaling about \$1,500, before Herman M. Dinst, Justice of the Peace, Westminster, Md., for assessments claimed to be due from Carroll county policy holders. Besides these there are about 350 suits that the receivers will have to bring against other policy holders in Frederick, Montgomery, Howard and Baltimore counties for back assessment due the company. These suits are all for assessments due the company when the receivers were appointed in July, 1915. Messrs. F. Neal Parke and Charles C. Clemson, receivers, have been very much occupied trying to unravel the tangled affairs of this company and the suits now brought are under an order of Court which requires them to bring the suits. Notices of the amounts claimed were sent to each policy holder in May last and about half of the persons who appeared to owe for back assessments either called to see the receivers or sent in payments, paying thus about \$2,500.00, which amount the receivers now have. The amount yet due is perhaps more than that already collected.

The claims filed against the Company are close to \$45,000 and it can thus be seen that, even after the back assessments have all been collected, if that is possible, it will be necessary for the receivers to get an Order of Court to lay another Assessment to meet the losses. It may be possible, however, that some compromise may be agreed upon among the policy holders themselves that would reduce the total amount of losses to be paid.


