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Woodrow Wilson Re-Elected President; Democratic Administration Vindicated

IT WAS A BATTLE OF MONEY AGAINST THE PEOPLE --- AND THE PEOPLE WON.

WILSON HAS 276 ELECTORAL VOTES AND HUGHES 243.

MARYLAND GOES DEMOCRATIC BY 20,000. TALBOTT RE-ELECTED.

WILSON CARRIES CARROLL COUNTY BY 414, LEWIS BY 59 AND TALBOTT BY 197---THE DRYS WIN BY 680---THE BUDGET COMES THROUGH WITH 769---PROHIBITION VOTE FALLS OFF.

ESTABLISHMENT OF A PARENTAL HOME SCHOOL.

TO BE PLACED AT COUNTY ALMS-HOUSE—OTHER IMPORTANT BUSINESS.

At the regular meeting of the Carroll County Board of Education held in the office of the Board on Wednesday, November 1st, all members were present. The meeting was called to order at 10:15 a. m.

The question of the heating plant at Taneytown was discussed and Mr. Unger reported it was necessary to settle upon the question of getting a heating plant at Taneytown, and it was decided that in view of the fact that the chances that some other school buildings are to be built next year, probably at New Windsor as well as Hampstead, the question of transferring these heating plants was not absolutely necessary this year, and it was thought best to leave them just as they are now.

The matter of consolidation of the Ploverville school was again brought to the attention of the Board and it was decided to leave the matter in the hands of Superintendent Unger and Commissioner Zentz.

The matter of consideration of Pennsylvania children attending school at Lineboro, Md., was left to the discretion of Superintendent Unger and Commissioner Zentz.

No other matters being up for discussion the Board adjourned at 2:30 p. m.

On Monday, the committee who have charge of the establishment of a school for incorrigibles met the County Commissioners, and requested that they agree to co-operate with the Board of Education by permitting the establishment of such a school at the County Alms House since the question of board and lodging was a big item in the operation of such a school.

The County Commissioners agreed to the proposal of the Board of Education, and such a school will be established in charge of an experienced teacher and disciplinarian and in this school all incorrigibles, unmanageable and disorderly children will be placed by order of the Board of Education until they show that they have honestly reformed and give sure promise of mending their ways.

When assigned to this school they will be in a special uniform, and their regular clothes removed in order that there may be no temptation to run away.

The establishment of a colored school at Slack's and additional ones at Weldon's and White Rock were taken up with the Board, and it was moved, seconded and passed that the matter of an additional school at Slack's and White Rock be placed in the hands of Supt. Unger and Commissioner Zentz, and the matter of an additional school at Weldon's be left to the discretion of Supt. Unger and Commissioner Hop-

kins. The consideration of establishing a parental home school or an ungraded school was brought before the Board by Superintendent Unger, and it was moved, seconded and passed that this matter be left to Superintendent Unger, President Wantz and Commissioner Allender to go before the County Commissioners with authority to act on whatever decision was made.

Authorization of repairs for Mt. View school was next brought up before the Board, and it was moved, seconded and passed that temporary repairs be made.

Status of school matters at Hampstead was put before the Board and Superintendent Unger and Commissioner Allender were continued as a committee on the Hampstead school matter and they were authorized by motion duly made, seconded and carried, to conclude the pending negotiations for the additional land to be obtained from the Hampstead Cemetery Co., for the enlargement of the present public school lot as in their judgment would be best to do under the circumstances and for the purpose of execution of the deed to the land to be conveyed to the Board of Education of Carroll county, the President and Superintendent Unger were authorized to unite in the execution of the deed and Clerk Charles Reed was authorized as attorney in fact to acknowledge the deed before some officer having authority to take acknowledgments of deeds.

In regard to the attendance law, the Board approved of Superintendent Unger's strict enforcement of the law.

Concerning the case of James Lockard, the Board decided that no exception should be made in this case.

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After one of the most remarkable battles of ballots ever witnessed in this country, the indications at the time of going to press are that Woodrow Wilson has been re-elected President of the United States.

The switch to a close fight in which the result hung on one State, followed predictions early Tuesday night that Hughes was elected by a landslide. This was based on the returns from New York and other Eastern sections. However, when the West and Middle West were heard from there was a switch, until it got pretty near down to a draw.

Both Houses of Congress will remain Democratic. Wilson carried Alabama, Arizona, Florida, Georgia, Idaho, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Hampshire, North Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, Virginia, Washington, and Wyoming, making a total of 272 electoral votes. Necessary to elect 266.

Maryland will cast her eight electoral votes for Woodrow Wilson as the result of the election, but Dr. Joseph Irwin France, Republican, will succeed Blair Lee, Democrat, in the United States Senate next March. The State remained true to its Democratic traditions and returned its four Democratic Congressmen. The Fifth District remained Republican and returned Sydney E. Mudd to the House, while Frederick N. Zihlman, of Allegany County, has redeemed the Sixth District for the Republicans and will hold a seat in the next House.

Zihlman, with enormous pluralities in his home county, Allegany, and Garrett, received the largest majority of any of the Congressional candidates.

The net gain for the Republicans is one Senator and one Congressman. By an enormous plurality the State also ratified the budget amendment, but prohibition was given a severe drubbing in 7 of the 11 localities in which the proposition was voted upon. Baltimore snuffed it under by an enormous majority of 50,000.

In Baltimore county it was beaten by 7,000 votes. Allegany County turned it down by the decisive majority of 1,500 votes. Prince George's County gave a majority against it of 250 votes.

The Brooklyn and Curtis Bay district of Anne Arundel County turned it down by over 400 votes. Annapolis gave a majority against it of nearly 500 votes.

In Ellicott City it was defeated by 26 votes. The vote here was 139 for to 165 against.

The "Dry" forces carried Frederick county by an estimated majority of 900 votes. They likewise carried Washington County, according to returns, by about 500 votes. Havre de Grace was carried by them by only 22 votes out of a total of over 900.

Carroll county surprised the Republicans by rolling up an old-time Democratic majority of 414 for Wilson. Both France and Talbott also came to the front.

Heavy Fines To Sell Bad Eggs. Summer egg shipments can be made safely only if candled and all worthless eggs eliminated. Shippers will be liable to prosecution and their eggs to confiscation if the shipments contain more than 5 per cent dead loss.

The United States Department of Agriculture, through the Bureau of Chemistry, has recently issued a bulletin containing the following statements: "Under the Federal Food and Drugs Acts, eggs, in common with other articles of food, are adulterated if they consist of wholly or in part of a filthy, decomposed or putrid substance. Section 2 of the act prohibits the shipment in interstate commerce of foods which are adulterated, and it is plain that this prohibition applies to the shipment in interstate commerce of 'current receipts' or of 'rejects' from candling rooms or of any other grade of eggs in the shell unless the filthy, decomposed or putrid eggs have been removed."

In the opinion of the department, eggs which contain yolk stuck to the shell, moldy eggs, black spots, mixed rots, and any other eggs which consist wholly or in part of a filthy, decomposed, or putrid substance, are adulterated. Under the new statutes persons who ship bad eggs, or who gather and bring to the stores or to dealers bad eggs, are liable to prosecution. The penalty is a fine of \$200 for the first offense, and \$300 for the second.
