United States Flagship Pennsylvania



The Pennsylvania, one of the most powerful warships afloat, of 31,400 tons, succeeded the Wyoming as flagship of the Atlantic fleet. She carries twelve fourteen-inch guns and cost more than \$7,000,000.

United States Super-Dreadnought Oklahoma



The Oklahoma carries ten fourteen-inch and twenty-one five-inch guns. She displaces 27,500 tons and has a speed of 20.50 knots an hour. She cost \$5,926,000.

United States Super-Dreadnought Wyoming



The Wyoming displaces 26,000 tons and is 562 feet long and carries twelve twelve-inch guns. She carries a crew of 1,043 officers and men.

United States Super-Dreadnought Utah



The Utah is a 21,825 ton warship, 521.5 feet long. Her main batteries consist of ten twelve-inch guns, and she has a crew of 1,014 officers and men.

The Super-Dreadnought Nevada



The chief features of the Nevada are the great triple turrets, two of them each mounting three fourteen-inch guns, while the smaller turrets each mount two of the fourteen inch guns. Her speed is twenty-one knots. Her belt armor is thirteen and one-half inches thick. She has a displacement of 27,500 tons.
