## SHALL WE FAIL?

Citizens of Carroll County:

After nearly two months of effort, during which time the cause has been presented in many places and through various channels Carroll county's quota of the Red Cross War Relief Fund is not more than one-third completed. We were allotted twenty-nine thousand dollars (\$29,000) and less than \$10,000 has been subscribed. Our neighbor, Frederick county, whose allotment, upon the same basis as ours was forty-four thousand dollars (\$44,000) has far exceeded that amount and has for its goal \$100,000. Other counties have raised their quotas. Freedom is the only district that has approached its portion; Westminster is nearly three thousand dollars short of hers. Is Carroll, rich, public spirited and patriotic, ready to admit such an inglorious defeat?

This Fund of One hundred million dollars (\$100,000,000) is to be spent entirely for relief work and not for munitions of war. Twenty-five per cent. will be returned to local Red Cross Organizations to purchase materials and for civilian relief. With a vigorous chapter of seven hundred members and at least one thousand workers a large sum of money will be required to meet its needs. So in subscribing to the fund you will also encourage those who have so enthusiastically and unselfishly been doing the actual work, sewing, knitting, making surgical dressings, &c.

The Campaign will close September first. For humanity's sake and as an evidence of appreciation of the sacrifice to be made by the boys who will soon go from our midst; will not those who have not contributed, those who have promised to subscribe and those who can increase their amounts do so at once? GERMANS DESERT TO FOE.	Appointed Officers of the Army.
<b>Hungry Soldiers Surrender in Great Numbers to Russian Officers.</b> Washington, Aug. 13.—The Russian embassy received a cable from Petrograd announcing that German soldiers are quitting their leaders in thousands and surrendering to the Russian commanders. This is the first time that Russia has claimed German troops have deserted their standards, although it has been stated frequently that Austrians went over to the Russians. The reports received here state that the Germans surrendered because they were starving. Reports received heretofore indicated that the Germans were much better fed than their enemies, and that many Russians had accepted imprisonment voluntarily in Teuton camps to avoid starvation. ## 40 CENT MILK

CARROLL COUNTY PRODUCERS MAKE RATE SCHEDULE—BIG ATTENDANCE—OFFICERS ELECTED—ADDRESSES WERE MADE BY MESSRS. HARRY AND HEEP.

About 400 farmers from every section of Carroll county were present at the meeting called by R. Smith Snader, vice president of the State Dairyman's Association, and James W. Beacham, Jr., a member of the price committee, to be held in the Westminster High School Building, this city, on Saturday afternoon, for the discussion of the raising of the price of milk during the winter months, and organizing the Carroll County Producers Association as a branch of the Maryland State Dairyman's Association.

The attendance and enthusiasm showed that the dairymen are in earnest about not filling their silos at the present price of corn unless guaranteed a standard price for milk. They were vigorous in denying that they were organizing to secure exorbitant prices, but made it emphatic that they would not produce milk at a loss.

Ex-Senator R. Smith Snader in opening the meeting said that his herd was not paying at present prices. I. W. Heep, the Harford county dairyman, said he would have to dispose of his herd unless conditions changed. W. A. Pickens, who has just completed a year's work as official tester for the County Cow Testing Association, submitted figures showing the receipts and expenditures of an ordinary cow. These figures were accepted by dairymen as a concise statement of conditions showing that they could not produce milk at present prices and that they must have a guaranteed price for the next six months for after they have filled their silos they have no redress.

D. G. Harry, president of the State Dairyman's Association, pointed out that a reasonable profit for milk would not work a hardship on the consumer, for if the silos are not filled there will be a scarcity of milk this winter and prices will be higher than asked for now. President Harry also called attention to the editorial in Friday's Sun and said that the State Dairy Association had already asked for an impartial investigation of conditions by the State authorities. A price of 35 cents for September, 40 cents for the next six months, 35 cents for April and 30 cents for the summer months for 4 per cent. milk to the Baltimore dealers were agreed upon as satisfactory to the producers.

The officers elected were Roland P. Baile, president; Scott Bollinger, secretary; James W. Beacham, secretary and treasurer. Thirty-five were enrolled as members of the New Association.

A statement was read by County Agent Kinzy on the receipts and expenditures for an ordinary cow for one year costing \$80 and giving 4,000 pounds of 4 per cent. milk at the present price, as follows: Hay, silage, pasture, etc., would cost \$120.65; receipts from milk, calf, etc., \$119.33, showing a loss of \$2.72. To make the receipts balance the expenditures, the owner of the cow would have to receive 41.5 cents per gallon.
