New Dreadnaught To Be Named Maryland.

The dreadnaught officially designated Number 46, when her keel was laid at Newport News, Va., April 24, 1917, is to be christened the Maryland, according to information given out at the Navy Department.

The new vessel, to be the first of her class launched, is now about 40 per cent completed. Her sister ships will be the battleships West Virginia, Colorado and Washington.

All were provided for in the early carrying out of the so-called three-year building plan of the Navy. They will, when floated, be the first American naval vessels to carry armament as heavy as 16 inch guns.

The Maryland and other craft of her class are officially listed as "single caliber" battleships. They have a displacement of 33,500 tons. Other figures in connection with the vessel and her sister ships are:

Ultimate cost: approximately \$16,000,000; length over all, 624 feet; length at water line, 600 feet; beam, 97 feet, 3 1/2 inches; mean draft, 30 feet, 6 inches.

Main battery, eight 16-inch, 45-caliber guns, secondary battery, twenty-two 5-inch so-called 51-caliber guns.


