FREEDOM DEMOCRATS AWAKE.

By reference to an article published elsewhere in this issue, telling of the organization of a permanent Democratic Club by the Democrats of Freedom District at a meeting held at Skyesville on Monday night of this week, it will be seen that the Democrats of the progressive end of the county have set an inspiring example to the Democrats of other districts. The meeting at Skyesville was largely attended by representative men who have been prominent in the affairs of the party in Freedom District, who came together with wholly unselfish purposes, to unite all factions, if any existed, and to promote the principles of the Democratic party, National, State and Local, and also to bring about a more united and enthusiastic support of Democratic candidates at the polls. Carroll county is naturally a Democratic county. With only semi-occasional breaks it clung tenaciously to the principles of the Democratic party and the Democratic faith for a hundred years. It is now under the control of the Republican party. Of the five representatives at Annapolis in the State Legislature, the only Democrat is Senator Wade H. D. Warfield. The county has gained nothing by this change in representation and the time is opportune this year to swing it back to old and safer moorings. This is declared to be the purpose of the Freedom District organization. It is expected that the Club will line up the full Democratic strength of the party in Freedom District and give the full force of its influence and vote to Democratic candidates in the coming election. With this end in view the move is to be heartily commended. If organizations in other districts can be promoted in the same generous spirit, the movement will result in the rehabilitation of the Democratic party in Carroll county. Solidly united, the Democratic party of Carroll has never been defeated. So united it can never be defeated. Organization is everything in politics. As a rule the best organization wins. If victory is to be certainly returned to the Democratic banner here, the plan adopted in Freedom District will bring it. The Club organized there is formed to make war only upon the common enemy—not upon individuals within the party, not the interest of factions, but solely to redeem Carroll county to Democratic control. The plan vigorously followed out will do it.

Besides the desirability of returning Carroll county once more to the faith of the fathers there is another vital question at issue. A determined effort is being made all along the line to discredit the party in state and nation. The coming fall, we must elect a Governor of Maryland. Next year a President of the United States is to be chosen. If we fail in the state this fall, we weaken our chances of holding Maryland in line next year, and dishearten our Democratic friends in other states. A victory here this year will hold up the hands of our President at Washington and inspire confidence in his splendid administration. If we fail, it will be a blow aimed at the President. We can only fail in Maryland as we have failed in Carroll county in recent years, by lack of organization and lack of effort. It must not be said that the Democrats of Carroll county are disloyal to our great President or to the principles of their party. It becomes vitally essential, therefore, that Democrats in every section of the county should follow the splendid example of Freedom District, put themselves together and consolidate and unify their forces for an old-time mopping up of the common enemy this fall. Democrats of Carroll must hold true to the faith if we are to redeem the county, help to hold the state solidly in line and to insure the counting of the State's electoral vote next year for the Democratic candidate for the Presidency.


