ENTRANCE EXAMINATIONS

STATE SCHOLARSHIPS IN ENGINEERING COURSES.

ENTRANCE EXAMINATIONS for the Department of Engineering, as well as for the College of Arts and Sciences, will be held in Gilman Hall, Homewood, Monday-Saturday, June 16-21, 1919, beginning at 9 A. M. each day, under the auspices of the College Entrance Examination Board.

Each Legislative District of Baltimore City and each County of the State, with the exception of Harford, Howard, Queen Anne's and Somerset counties, will be entitled to one or more scholarships for the year 1919-1920, in addition to those which have already been assigned.

Under the provisions of the Act of Assembly, the County and City Scholarships in the Department of Engineering are awarded only to serving students whose financial circumstances are such that they are unable to obtain an education in Engineering unless free tuition be granted to them.

Scholarships may be awarded to graduates of Loyola College, St. John's College, Washington College, Western Maryland College, Maryland Agricultural College, Mt. St. Mary's College, Rock Hill College.

One scholarship will be awarded "At Large".

Applicants should address The Registrar, The Johns Hopkins University, for blank forms of application and for catalogues giving information as to examinations, award of scholarships, and courses of instruction. The next session begins Tuesday, September 30, 1919, May 16-17.
