PAID HIGH FOR THEIR BOOZE
Millionaires Fined \$1,000 For Receiving Liquor in Dry State.

John Browning, son of the famed machine-gun inventor of that name; Joseph Eccles, millionaire sugar magnate, and J. H. Devine, an attorney, all of Ogden, each was fined \$1,000 by Federal Judge Van Fleet for receiving liquor shipped interstate into "dry" territory. They pleaded guilty.

The authorities were satisfied the trio ordered the liquor for their personal use and not for sale.

Joseph F. Delaney, an express messenger, who aided the shipment of the liquor from this city to Ogden, was fined \$500.

Alleged bootleggers, who engineered the shipment and sale, according to Department of Justice agents, pleaded not guilty and will be tried later.




