Enfranchisement of Women For Next Election Recommended.

Prompt ratification of the equal suffrage amendment to the Constitution of the United States, when passed by the Senate, in order that the women of the nation may vote in 1920, was urged by the Democratic National Committee during its Chicago session in resolutions proposed by Mrs. Percy V. Pennybacker, of Texas, former president of the General Federation of Women's Clubs.

The resolution follows: "Whereas, the Democratic party stands committed to the just cause of woman suffrage, and

"Whereas, it now seems certain that the federal amendment granting suffrage to women will within a few days pass the United States Senate, and

"Whereas, the Democratic party earnestly desires that women of all States may vote in the election of 1920; therefore, be it

"Resolved, by the Democratic National Committee, that it urges the calling of special sessions of State legislatures wherever necessary to ratify said amendment."

The resolutions were unanimously and enthusiastically adopted.

Since the resolution was submitted by Congress, legislation of the proposed amendment, and others have been called to meet in special session to vote on ratification.
