

OPEN HUNTING SEASON

Information For Benefit of Sportsmen In Answer to Requests—Precedence To Federal Law.

In response to numerous inquiries it has received concerning the open seasons for hunting game, the Commission of Maryland, through E. Leo LeCompte, State Game Warden, has issued a statement for the benefit of sportsmen.

The statement follows: The first open season is on doves, which under the State law opens August 15, and closes December 24. However, the Federal law supercedes our State law, and opens the season September 1, and closes it December 15.

The open season on yellow leg black breasted and golden plover, August 15 to November 30. "Plain birds September 1 to November 30.

During the season of 1918, the Federal Government closed the season on road birds. However, on January 17, 1919, there was an order issued by the United States Department of Agriculture, opening the season on road birds in this State from September 1 to October 30.

The open season on squirrels, August 25 to October 1, closing until November 10 and open until December 24. However, the following counties are exempt from this law: Anne Arundel, Talbot, Charles, Prince George's and Calvert, in the open season for squirrels is November 10 to December 24. St. Mary's county has no closed season.

Partridges, pheasant, woodcock, rabbit and wild turkey—November 10 to December 24. However, there is a closed season on ring-neck pheasant in Baltimore, Worcester, Harford and Dorchester counties, and a closed season on quail in Frederick county until 1921.

Wild-fowl, including ducks, geese, brant, jacksnipe and crow bills—November 1 to January 31. It is illegal to export any game (water fowl excepted) out of Maryland.

Shooting from a power boat prohibited under the Federal and State laws. Shooting at night, shooting on Sunday, also prohibited.

The State-wide Hunters' License Law, from which funds a district Game Warden force has been maintained, has been very beneficial in increasing our game in this State, and we appreciate the co-operation our district deputy wardens have received through the fee deputy wardens and the public in general.

The law requires all persons who hunt on property other than their own or rented by them, to procure a license to hunt, shoot or kill game which is protected by the laws of this State. This license, however, does not permit persons to hunt game during closed season. The licenses are issued June 1 of each year and expire on May 31 of each year. The color of said license is changed yearly, and persons found hunting with a license issued prior to June 1, 1919, will be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law.

There is no open season at present on any game in this State, and persons who hunt prior to August 15th should be prosecuted for hunting during closed season. We request all persons in this State who have the interest of game and fish laws at heart to report any violations they know of to this Department or to one of the district deputy game wardens, at which time prosecution will be instituted, and an investigation will be made.

Quarreled With Wife; Dynamited Himself.

Johnstown, Pa., July 24.—Following a quarrel with his wife, Stanley Muschback, aged 38, an employe of the Springfield Coal Company, of Nanticoke, near here, left his home, secured two sticks of dynamite, attached the caps, lit the fuse and sat on the explosive.

After the explosion, which blew his body into bits, an undertaker with his assistants, with buckets, picked up the remains, which were found as far as 100 feet away. Children playing in the neighborhood yesterday found pieces of Muschback's body. He is survived by his wife and five children.

WHAT DRY CODE WILL PROHIBIT

No Provision For Seizure of Liquor In Private Dwellings; Every Section of the Code Has Been Tried Out By the Dry States.

There is so much misinformation about the provisions of the Federal Prohibition Code, that it will be of value to know just what the Code does not prohibit, said Wayne B. Wheeler, general counsel of the Anti-Saloon League of America. It does not prevent the possession of intoxicating liquors in a private dwelling if the liquor was secured before the law goes into effect. It does not permit a search warrant to be issued for such liquor in a private dwelling. It does not prevent the sale of alcoholic liquors for non-beverage purposes such as for medicinal, mechanical, artistic, scientific, industrial or any such purpose. It does not prohibit the manufacture and sale of soft drinks containing not more than one-half of one per cent alcohol by volume. It will not interfere with the sale of alcoholic extracts, under the proposed Amendment from the Judiciary Committee, unless they are sold for beverage purposes. It provides complete machinery for the development of the industrial alcohol industry. It does prohibit the manufacture, sale, transportation, exportation, furnishing, receiving or possession of intoxicating liquors except as authorized in this act. It does specifically authorize in Section 35 of the Act, that liquors secured before the law goes into effect may be possessed in a private dwelling. This provision is more liberal than those found in the laws of the Prohibition States. The liquor cannot be seized even though the home is turned into a speakeasy. Liquor in a home which is a speakeasy should be subject to seizure. In this respect it should be and doubtless will be changed.

Every section of the proposed bill except the one last referred to, has been tried out in the States and found to be necessary if the law is to be enforced. The effort to make it appear that the law is drastic is a part of the brewery propaganda. The friends of prohibition will not ask for unreasonable or unprecedented provisions.

PACKERS' BOARD VAST STORES OF FOOD IN CHICAGO

Stocks of Meat, Butter and Eggs Largely Increased Since June 1.

Criminal prosecution of the "Big Five" packers, of Chicago by the Federal Government was intimated by the announcement that a double investigation into food prices and conditions is being conducted.

This evidence, Federal Building reports say, is to be presented to the Grand Jury the latter part of this month or the first of next.

The second investigation is conducted directly by the United States Attorney's office, and is aimed just now at the cold storage warehouses, the majority of which are said to be controlled by the packers.

Figures of June 1 which were obtained from the Illinois Department of Agriculture touching on food supplies in storage in Chicago were received by the United States Attorney's office today. They show the following foodstuffs in storage:

Beef, \$9,000,000 pounds. Pork, 79,517,000 pounds. Butter, 7,825 pounds. Eggs 1,280,000 cases.

The report states that since the last regular compilation of figures June 1 stocks of these commodities have grown in abnormal proportions and that their release would go far toward relieving the present food shortage and reducing prices.

There are thirty dozen eggs to the case, indicating that a month and a half ago there were 35,400,000 dozen eggs in storage in Chicago. Investigators for the District Attorney say the quantity of butter and eggs in storage undoubtedly has largely increased above the figures of June 1, and an effort will be made to see what amounts of these commodities are now in storage.
