

EDITH CAVELL'S ATTORNEY MAY FACE MAN WHO SENTENCED HER

Belgian Advocate, Whom German Governor Tried to Send to Firing Squad, Will Be Witness for Prosecution if Trial Occurs.

If Baron von der Laucken-Walkenitz, chief witternor, and regarded by many as the real ruler of Belgium during the German occupation, is brought to trial at the Old Bailey in London, there will be present an accuser whom Laucken tried to send to the firing squad at the Tir National.

On October 21, 1915, Laucken returned to the legation and demanded that De Leval be given up. Mr. Whitlock refused. De Leval went to London, where he remained throughout the war.

MILLIONAIRE IS A WAITER

Young Californian Serves Food in Restaurant On \$3000 Wage.

Three thousand dollars, plus 15 cents an hour and his meals, is the wages Milton G. Richardson of Pasadena, Cal., will receive for one week of service as a waiter in a restaurant in Minneapolis.

It's a grand adventure in "seeing how the other half lives" for Richardson. He calls it that. Richardson is a son of G. D. Richardson of Pasadena, better known as "Oil" Richardson. Just how numerous are the parental millions the young man has hesitated to say, but he admitted there are "at least two."

"Yes, I was passing through here a week ago with a friend, George Wesley, also of Pasadena," the millionaire waiter explained. "We sat here in this very restaurant and I remarked what an easy time of it the waiters in a place like this must have."

"My friend made a wager with me that I couldn't work here for a week. We were on our way to our summer home at Lake Forest, Ill. When I got home the wager recurred to my mind. I got to looking at my hands. They were soft and white. I began to realize that I had never done anything that is usually called work and I decided I'd take him up on his wager."

"I borrowed some clothing from my butler and came back here," he continued his explanation. "I started to work. I believe there's \$3000 or something like that waiting for me if I hold out."

Richardson is going after his experience in social investigation at the bottom. He is living in a cheap room and on the wages he is paid by the restaurant management.

"Oh, yes! I get 15 cents an hour—that's the rate for beginners," he explained. "They tell me I'll earn 25 cents an hour after a while."

Howard H. Talbot, a college chum of Richardson's at Leland Stanford University when the young man was a student at the California college for three years, was a patron of the restaurant. Richardson recognized him and stayed as far away as possible.

"I didn't think he recognized me," he said, but Talbot must have done so for a report about the "millionaire waiter got abroad"—From the Minneapolis Tribune.


