BRIEFS.

Select your seed corn now for next year's crop. It is the best insurance you can get on your corn crop for 1920. Select ears that are well filled, chest high on healthy matured stalks, you can increase your yield several bushels per acre. Try enough seed, ten good ears, for an acre.

A competent statistician has recently calculated that strikes have been responsible for a shrinkage of \$10,000,000 per month in productions for the past eight months. Add to this shrinkage in production the increased waste incident to idleness and can anyone feel surprise that high prices incident to the former are startling.

With a wrecking crew and divers examining the sunken hull, and with scores of boats searching surrounding waters and islands at Key West, for trace of bodies or of survivors, the fate of the 450 passengers and members of the crew of the Spanish steamer Valbanera, which foundered during the hurricane last week is expected to be cleared up.

On several occasions eels have caused considerable trouble at the Thurmont Electric Power Plant. Coming through the big feed pipe to the building, they got into the water gate and stopped the flow of water. The largest eel taken out weighed six pounds, and a number weighed three pounds.

The House Pension Committee reported favorably a bill granting a minimum monthly pension of \$50 to the veterans of the war between the states. Their widows would receive \$30 a month, and their children under 16 years of age \$6 a month, while nurses would receive \$30 a month. The measure would add \$65,000,000 to the pension roll in its first year.

Salvaging \$35,000,000 worth of gold ingots and bullion the White Star liner Laurentic is reported to have carried when she was sunk the night of January 25, 1917, off Fanad Light, Port Salen, Ireland, one of the northernmost headlands of Ireland at the entrance to Lough Swilly, is being conducted by the salvage ship Racer.

If plans do not miscarry Mahon and Kelly will agree to agree with in a week to work together, hand in hand, for the Democratic state and city tickets. Kelly is willing that Mahon shall be boss of the Democratic city machine. He is also willing to resume his old job as lieutenant under Mahon, the position held by him when Mahon was the head of the "Royal Family."

C. W. Lidie, who conducted picture shows at Thurmont has discontinued. The duties of mayor of Thurmont, deputy sheriff and constable, and carrier of mails to and from the Western Maryland, hauling passengers, together with other work, is said to have caused him to discontinue picture shows. Wasn't it enough to?

The postal clerks of Pennsylvania of first and second class postoffices started a movement at a meeting in assembly including representatives from Gettysburg, Hanover and York this week in the Penn-Harris Hotel, Harrisburg, for higher wages. Delegates attended the meeting from twenty first and second class post-offices of the State representing 400 postal clerks.
