By having his left arm caught between the pulley and belt of an ice cream freezer at John D. Bowers' store Wednesday morning William Hutter, clerk, is nursing a badly bruised and sprained arm. His suffering is intense. Hopes are entertained that nothing serious will result.

In Illinois, during the past year, 109 pig clubs were organized with an enrollment of 934; of this number 49 finished the work and kept complete records. Members reporting managed 562 pigs weighing in all 22,841 pounds. The value of these animals was \$24,684.56; cost of production, \$13,680.34; profit, \$11,004.22.

A picture postcard was posted by a lady at Southall on April 24, 1906, for delivery in the adjoining parish of Hanwell, London. According to a postmark, it took three hours to reach Paddington district sorting office, but it took over 13 years to get back to Hanwell, where it was delivered a few days ago.

Gen. John J. Pershing, according to a rumor prevalent will announce shortly his engagement to Mrs. Annie Peoples Boyd, widow of a late member of the American soldier's staff, Col. Carl Boyd, U. S. A., and at present at Hagerstown, Md. Supporting the belief of this expected engagement came the fact that General Pershing had leased the country residence of Mrs. Henry C. Corbin, near Rock Creek Park, one of the most attractive sites neighboring Washington.

Two larceny cases, both resulting in acquittals, the first on the ground of insanity, the second because of lack of evidence, were tried in the Frederick circuit court, Wednesday morning. Guy Gibbons was brought to trial charged with larceny of one gold watch, valued at \$15 from George Wagner, and of \$78 in currency from the same party. The jury had been adjudicated insane and under the law could not plead. The court accordingly pleaded not guilty for the accused and the evidence in the case was heard. A verdict of acquittal was returned. An acquittal was asked on the ground that the defendant did not mentally responsible for the act. It was brought out that Gibbons had escaped from the insane asylum at Sykesville, and that he had been guilty of several other larcenies including the larceny of a pole. "A man who steals a pole can't be expected to have something wrong with him," commented State's Attorney Aaron R. Anders. The court ordered Gibbons return to the asylum and would see that he be watched more closely in the future as to prevent another escape.
