The unfair tactics used against him, he feels, should be exposed and the people of the county should be given an opportunity to show their disgust at such conduct in public affairs.

Senator Kaufman does not repudiate his Republicanism, it is stated. Toward the other candidates he says that he has no desire to do any harm, but he, like Prof. Harris, feels it his duty to give the people a chance to uphold important principles and party domination.
