## JUST GOVERNMENT LEAGUE MEANS BUSINESS

MET AT MRS. O. D. GILBERT'S AND ELECTED OFFICERS—MISS DUBROW NATIONAL ORGANIZER, PRESENT AND MAKES PLANS.

The Westminster branch of the Just Government League held a meeting October 7th at the home of Mrs. O. D. Gilbert for the purpose of planning the work for the ratification of the suffrage amendment. Miss Mary Dubrow, National organizer, came from Baltimore to consult with the members here about the coming campaign.

"With the action taken by the National Democratic Committee last week which will place an equal number of women on the Democratic Committee and also the resolve to organize the women in every state and again the resolution passed to urge all Democrats to help the ratification of the suffrage amendment. It would seem that national leaders are now as anxious as the women to have this measure ratified. The Republican leaders are also working along the same line there is every reason to feel assured that we will be voting in 1920." This statement was made by Miss Dubrow at the meeting.

In order to carry on an effective campaign to urge Maryland to ratify and to bring before the state the suffrage situation as it now is the Westminster league has reorganized as follows:

President, Miss Mary Shellman; first vice president, Mrs. S. K. Herr; second vice president, Mrs. C. Billingslea; secretary, Miss Dorothy Eldredge; treasurer, Mrs. Carroll Albaugh.

It was decided to hold a mass meeting on a pageant in November.

Miss Eldredge is the chairman of the pageant which will show the "Enfranchised Women of the World." This pageant is being written by the Vagabond Players of Baltimore.

Mrs. Diefenbach, Mrs. Florence Vanderford and Mrs. Albaugh are to act as the committee of finance and expenditure. Mr. Gilbert is chairman of the committee on printing and publicity.

The officers expressed full confidence in the action of the national leaders who are doing so much to further the cause of political freedom for women. "It is to be hoped that men of both parties will see that the cause of the woman is a just one and entered the political field," was the statement made by Mrs. Gilbert.
